ADVANCE RATES BY DEVIANT WAYS

Traffic Managers Slide Up Scale Without Changing Published Schedules.

Railroad traffic managers are engaged in figuring out methods of increasing freight rates in various roundabout ways. There are numerous methods by which the burdens of the shipper may be enlarged and the revenues from freight carrying waxed fatter.

Increase Carload Earnings. The transcontinental freight bureau has been in session in Chicago working on an advance in minimum weights which govern the minimum rates of shippers.

Change Classifications. The advance in the minimum heretofore made from time to time in lumber very materially increased carload earnings.

There are a number of ways by which freight earnings of the railroads may be materially increased, besides the direct advance of the published tariffs.
