THERE ARE LIES ON GAY PARIS

French Capital Despairs Because of Invasion of Unknown Bug Similar to American Kissing Insect. Cafes Are Infested.

Troubles of a Small Community—How the District Had Trouble Electing a Municipal Council—General News of France.

Paris, June 6.—All Paris is in despair at the invasion of an unknown fly or bug which in many ways reminds one of the American kissing bug. The air is literally filled with these insects, which are more than three-fourths of an inch long and at night the boulevards present the remarkable spectacle of thousands of people fighting like madmen and trying to defend themselves against the bugs with canes, fans and newspapers.

The owners of the famous cafes and restaurants along the boulevards, most of whose customers ordinarily partake of their meals and drinks on the sidewalks, declare that unless the insects are driven away they will be ruined, for no one cares to while away time outside a cafe when he has to keep his face going like a windmill to defend himself against these winged, heavily armored pests.

Whoever knows from where the insects now known as the "Eibons de Saint Marc" have come, but curiously enough the plague is confined to this city and has not reached the country.

The little commune of Le Trestre-Gabrian has had considerable difficulty in electing its municipal council. The municipal council must by law consist of 19 members. But Le Trestre-Gabrian possesses only five voters. There are three houses in the village—three farms and a small shop.

In Paris at election time the candidates make many "big" remarks in the newspapers. One of the candidates in the election for mayor of Paris, M. de la Porte, made the following remarks in the "Journal": "I am not a candidate for mayor, but I am a candidate for the hearts of my fellow citizens."

It would have been an impossible thing to have found a sober man at Paris the other day for the streets of the little community were running with wine. The police abandoned the fire and the crowd copiously. Many persons brought bottles, buckets and even kettles which they filled with wine.

Several hundred people were overpowered by the strong wine, and were removed insensible by the police, while many others became so drunk that they lay about on the pavements.

RUSSIAN PLAY WINS ALL PARIS HAS BEEN FORMED

Historic Drama Founded on Narrative of Ruskin—A Fine Company.

Paris, June 6.—A Russian historical drama forms a refreshing variation from the old standard works at the Paris opera house, and shows how Russian operatic methods differ from the conventional style of western Europe. "Boris Godunov," by Musorgsky, is played by a splendidly efficient company from St. Petersburg and Moscow, who not only sing but act superbly.

Founded on the narrative of Pushkin, the play deals with a romantic incident in Russian history, in the reign of the usurping Czar Boris in the sixteenth century. Before ascending the throne Boris has instigated the murder of Dmitri, second son of Ivan the Terrible, who at his coronation is already feeling the first pangs of remorse.

The play depicts the murder of Dmitri, the son of the Czar, and the subsequent events leading to the fall of Boris. The play is a masterpiece of dramatic art, and has won the admiration of all who have seen it.

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ALL GUARD EDWARD ON HIS VOYAGE

Plans to Meet Czar at Sea to Minimize Attempt at Assassination—Press of England Magnifies Political Aspect of Visit.

London, June 6.—Fears for the safety of King Edward during his visit to the czar, which takes place June 9, have resulted in extraordinary precautions to guard the English monarch.

According to the present program the meeting of the two sovereigns will take place entirely at sea, thus minimizing the opportunities of assassins to do mischief.

The king is praised for the courage which he is displaying in going to Russia and his example is quoted as a model for the world to follow. It is believed that the king's visit will be a success and that it will result in a permanent peace between the two nations.
