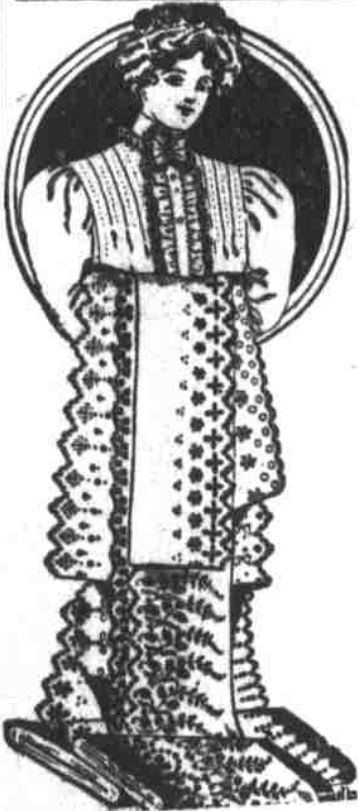

BLIGHT NOT A TERROR TO ROGUE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
 Medford, Or., June 9.—Climate and soil conditions are such as to make the Rogue River valley almost proof against pear blight. This dread disease, which has ruined the pear orchards of California and other fruit sec-

tions, has existed for 15 years in the orchards around Medford and has done but slight damage in this period and can easily be controlled. If proper watchfulness and care are exercised. This is the opinion of a majority of the members of the Rogue River Valley Horticultural society, comprising the orchardists about Medford. Nearly every practical orchard man and owner, who has given the subject a chance from study, observation and actual experiment, that the theories of Professor M. B. Waite of the United States agricultural department, holding that pear blight is due to bacteria and contagious, are fallacious, and that the theory of Inspector J. F. Myser of Rifle, Colorado, that pear blight is the result of climatic and soil conditions and

that the bacteria is the result of the blight and not the cause, is correct. **Zealous Discussion.** L. D. Harris, manager of the famous Lewis orchard, and an accepted authority on diseases of fruit trees, led the discussion at the Horticultural society monthly meeting Saturday. He stated as the result of experiments and observation, that climatic and soil conditions were the sole cause of blight, and challenged anyone to infect a tree by putting blight bacteria upon the blossoms of the trees not affected. He stated that blight had existed for years in the local orchards, but because of unfavorable natural conditions had never made much headway and never could when proper care was exercised. His opinion is confirmed by J. B. Merrick,

Tom Pankey of the Hopkins orchards and others. **Conditions to Blame.** In order for blight to flourish the right conditions must prevail. A sharp frost, with the tree full of sap, and favorable soil conditions, with the main roots in water, is the most common cause. The blight starts from the extremities of the branches and very rapidly works down to the trunk, killing the tree as it spreads. The only preventive is to cut the tree severely as soon as the blight shows itself. If not, within a remarkably brief period, the entire tree will be dead. As the most favorable conditions possible for pear blight obtained this year, when a series of heavy frosts caught the trees in blossom and full of young fruit, the fact that there is compara-

tively little blight in the orchards of the valley and none where proper vigilance has been exercised, proves conclusively that conditions in this valley are most unfavorable for pear blight and that this is the greatest natural belt for the growing of pears known in the world. Trees bear heavier, produce a finer quality of fruit and are more immune from diseases that infest this delicate tree. **Careful Watching Needed.** Mr. Harris states that on the Lewis orchard one man has been able to prevent the spread of blight on 50 acres by removing twig infections before the worms are present, and keeps the blight out of the orchard. It is important for every pear orchard to keep a man watching the blight, for it works very rapidly. No one intelligent enough to

sight an infested twig need fear the blight in Jackson county. The blight has destroyed the great pear orchards of California and Colorado and the fact that local orchards are almost immune is proof conclusive that the Medford pear district is the greatest in the world, and the surest of investments. Fourteen years ago there was blight in local orchards. There is less in proportion to planted acreage today than there was then, and the loss from blight in these 14 years has been less than 1/2 of 1 per cent. County Inspector Taylor advised all growers to keep strict watch and remove infested parts of trees. A communication was read from Secretary Wilson refusing the request of the society for a joint demonstration between Professor Waite and Mr. Myser.

SUPREME LODGE OF WORKMEN CONVENES

 Des Moines, Ia., June 8.—The supreme lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, one of the oldest and strongest of the fraternal organizations in America, began its annual meeting in Des Moines today, and will remain in session about two weeks. In addition to the usual amount of routine business the meeting will discuss and act upon a number of proposed changes in the constitution and by-laws of the order. About 500 delegates are attending the meeting, representing 28 grand lodges in the United States and two grand lodges in Canada.
