

# EXPLOSION AT SUMMER LAKE

## Summer Lake in Southern Oregon Contains Group of Large Springs.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)  
Washington, June 9.—The geological survey has made a report of exploration in Oregon on the Ana river.

The northern end of the valley of Summer lake, in southern Oregon, contains a group of three or four large springs which unite to form Ana river, the principal feeder of the lake from the south. These springs occur in a semi-arid region, where their volume—about 100,000 gallons a minute—and their constant flow through wet and dry seasons make them objects of unusual interest, and their source has always been a puzzle to local investigators.

### Summer Lake.

Summer lake valley is a depression bordered on the west and north by conspicuous cliffs of basalt and on the east by lower rims of the same material. The stream, the Chewaucum river, rising in the wooded mountains west of the basin, discharges into it through a conspicuous canyon, but the flow of this stream into the lake is the great springs at the head of the valley, and a large part of it escapes over the surface southward through the Chewaucum marsh into the main lake. The surface of the lake is somewhat lower than that partially filled by Summer lake. The surface drainage into the basin from the high, rocky, arid plateaus to the east is small.

The temperatures of the Ana river waters—20 degrees or more above the mean annual temperature of the region—indicate that the springs rise from depths 1,000 feet or more below the surface; and as the alluvium that forms the valley floor is probably a mere veneer whose thickness is much less than this, it is probable that the waters rise from the underlying rocks along one or more of the lines of great passages afforded by the faults or fracture planes that limit the valley. But even if the springs yield rock waters rising from depths, the source of these waters still remains unknown.

### Furnish the Water.

The geologists of the United States geological survey who have been studying the region rejected at once the idea that the springs are artesian. Artesian springs could furnish the water, partly because of the aridity of these areas, and partly because their investigations had revealed structural conditions that would tend to prevent the circulation of the water westward to the point at which it issues. # RECTOR RUNS UP NUMBER OF DEBTS

Los Angeles, June 9.—Rev. Baker P. Lee, the prominent and high-salaried rector of the fashionable Christ Episcopal church, has become so hopelessly involved in financial entanglements through borrowing money from his parishioners that the subject was held before Bishop Johnson and a committee appointed by the official board to take charge of Lee's monetary affairs. It develops that the rector has borrowed approximately \$28,000 from various members of his parish, and some outside, giving in one instance a chattel mortgage of \$2,500 on his personal effects. In an effort to avoid publicity and embarrassing comment the official board decided today to stand by the rector and place him on his feet by signing notes and withholding regularly a part of his salary to be applied on his debts. To date the rector's salary was increased from \$4,000 to \$5,000 a year. He will be allowed \$200 a month out of his salary to meet current expenses. Bishop Johnson, by a request of a number of parishioners, asked Lee to resign, but he declined.

# READY TO CONSTRUCT THE LYTLE ROAD

# THINKS MRS. BEEDE DID NOT DIE AS WAS REPORTED



Mrs. Ruth Kinney-Ellis Beede, Who Was Reported Dead, but May Still Be Alive.

Los Angeles, June 9.—Mrs. Ruth Kinney Goldie Ellis Beede, who was reported to have died a few weeks ago, is probably alive and living in Los Angeles, according to a prominent local attorney, who claims to have seen her on the streets today. Mrs. Ellis-Beede is the beautiful 35-year-old heiress to a \$200,000 California estate who figured prominently in the beauty contest recently conducted by the Portland Journal. She hurriedly left Portland for California a few months ago, when one of the two men who claim to be her husband applied to the authorities for a warrant for her arrest, charging her with bigamy.

The marriage to Ellis did not prove a success and it was not long until the girl applied for a divorce and was granted a decree in the circuit court. Ellis appealed to the supreme court of the state and a few months ago secured a reversal of the decree. In the meantime the girl had become the wife of Charles Beede, a floorwalker at Lipman, Wolfe & Co.'s department store at Portland. When Ellis heard of this he appealed to the authorities for a warrant for the arrest of his former wife, but discovered that she had departed for California, accompanied by her foster mother, Mrs. Kinney. Several weeks later a telegram was received by Mr. Kinney at Portland, stating that his foster daughter had died. No details were given and he immediately came to this city. While here he refused to discuss the report of his daughter's death and it is reported that nothing has been seen of him in Portland since his return to that city.

# "WETS" FIGHT IN MEDFORD COURT

## Move to Enjoin "Drys" From Closing Up Town to Please County.

Medford, Or., June 9.—Action was begun today to prevent prohibition from going into effect in Medford, as provided under the city charter. A temporary injunction was applied for from Circuit Judge Hanna by Attorney Robert G. Smith, representing J. C. Hall, who is expected to be the prohibitionist candidate to dissolve the injunction, which the wet forces will seek to have made permanent. Attorney McAlister of the Anti-Saloon league is in the city, presumably to defend the league's case. The charter's clause under which action is brought reads as follows: "The city council shall have power and authority within the city limits of Medford to license, tax, regulate or prohibit barrooms, drinking shops, billiard rooms, bowling alleys, dance halls, and all places where spirituous, malt or vinous liquors are sold or kept for sale, respectively of any general law of the state on this subject enacted by the legislature or by the people at large." The county court is compelled by the option law to declare the result of prohibition 11 days after the election. The case will be argued at every point by the wet town advocates.

# COUNTY SEAT WAR IN OKLAHOMA

Denlow was appointed deputy county clerk Sunday.

# SHIPS ORDERED TO LEAVE NAVY YARD

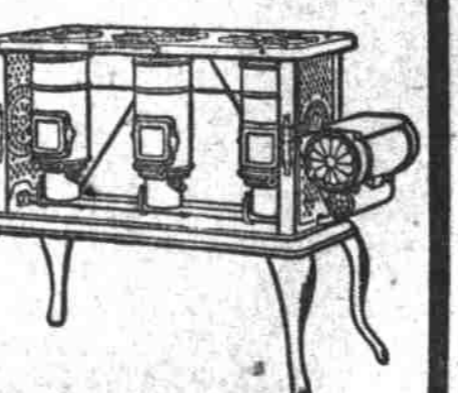

# LION LEAPS INTO CROWDED CIRCUS

## New York Society Women and School Children Given Great Fright.

Greenwich, Conn., June 9.—Nero, a large lion with a record of having killed three men in the seven years of his life, angered by repeated jabbing with a stick and the firing of blank cartridges, leaped at its keeper today and escaped from its cage in a side show of Washburn's circus. It was the fault of an assistant keeper who failed to pull the iron door in time, and he has disappeared, so fearful was he of being mobbed even after the lion had been caged again. The circus was exhibiting across the street from the high school on Havemeyer place, and in the circus crowd were hundreds of school children. Around the cage at the time were society people of New York, among them Mrs. Frank Hastings, Mrs. Clifford Harmon, the daughter of R. C. Benedict, Mrs. George Nichols, Mrs. Frank Gould, the children of Percy Rockefeller and Mrs. Rockefeller.

### Beast in Bags.

The keeper first worked the lion into a rage by teasing it with a stick and firing off a pistol in its face. Then he stepped into the cage. The lion made a fierce lunge at him and he retreated. On the ground below stood the assistant, in his hands a rope attached to the door. He was too busy watching the trainer escape from the cage to pull the rope quickly, and with a roar the lion leaped into the crowd. A policeman pulled up the canvas and while the lion was being pushed women and children out of it and followed. For a time it was not known whether the animal had escaped or not, but circus men grabbed the guy ropes and held the canvas down to keep him close if he should be in the tent, while the alarm went through the other tents and into the main canvas, where the show proper was about to start. Meanwhile the crowd fled under the tents, over stone walls into adjacent buildings and up trees and telegraph poles. Washburn told the police to shoot the lion, and they and everybody else who had a revolver got ready; but soon the beast was heard growling in the tent, and over the top of the tent were heard the trumpeting of monkeys, and the elephants were trumpeting.

### Offered a Reward.

Washburn offered a reward of \$100 for the capture of the lion, and four circus men crawled under the tent, spread out the canvas top of a wagon and tried to form a semi-circle and corner the lion. One of the men succeeded in throwing a lasso around its neck. Other took the wheels off a wagon, cage, laid the cage on the ground, and by using meat as bait got the lion into it. There was a shout of triumph as this was accomplished and the circus tents filled up again with the crowd.
