ADDRESS OF GRAND MASTER

Feature of Meeting of Grand Lodge of Masons to Begin Tomorrow.

FIRE DEPARTMENT TO PAY FOR HYDRANTS

Water Board Declines to Use Its Money, and Council Must Act.

At a meeting of the ways and means committee of the city council yesterday afternoon the members decided to postpone action on the purchase of fire hydrants until next week, when a special meeting of the committee will be called. It is probable that the committee will recommend to the council that Mayor Lane's advice in this matter be adopted and the hydrants purchased by the fire department.

When the annual appropriations were made at the first of the year \$42,000 was set aside from the water department fund for the purchase of the hydrants. The water board declined to buy hydrants from its funds, contending that the hydrants were a part of the fire department system.

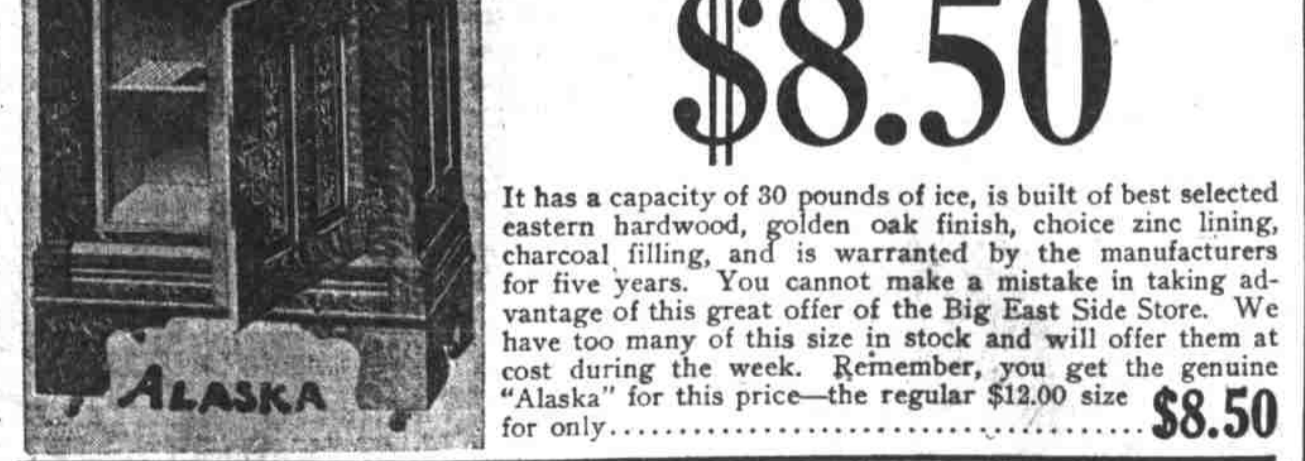
