The trial competitors are under the direction of the National Rifle Association of America. The trials are to continue four days and on each day the contestants are to shoot through the Olympic match course, consisting of two sighting shots and 15 shots for record at 200, 500, 600, 800 and 1,000 yards, or 102 shots each day.
