CHARGE DODGE HAS FAVORITES

Irvington People Seek Copy of Superintendent of City Water Department.

It is new water mains for Holladay Park and Irvington or the recall for Water Superintendent Frank T. Dodge or whomsoever is responsible for Dodge's appointment and administration, if the recall cannot reach him. Two east side additions want new water mains and new gas mains and hard-surface pavements, and the property-holders contend that they have been shunted off in their desires by Mr. Dodge, wherefore they are after his scalp.

A large number of the residents of Holladay Park, Irvington and Holladay addition met at the Irvington tennis courts Tuesday night and perfected the organization of the Holladay-Irvington Improvement Association. The gathering was composed of the property-holders of the district, and D. L. Povey was elected president, and C. D. Cooper secretary and treasurer. Most significant of all, however, was the assessment of \$5 a member for the creation of a working fund. With this fund, which is to be kept up by a monthly assessment of \$5 a member, an attorney is to be employed to see what legal action can be taken to force the water mains and gas mains laid, in order that the pavements may be put down throughout the district.

SMITH CAN SHIP HAY AND OATS IN SAME O. R. & N. CAR HEREAFTER

If you ship a few sacks of oats with a few bales of hay the O. R. & N. company holds that you must pay the same for both the hay and the oats. In addition you must give the company 80 cents per 100 for the oats. At least that is what the railroad tried to make Frank L. Smith pay. The Smith meat company shipped a few tons of hay from Union, Oregon, to Portland. The railroad charged about 80 cents for the hay and about 10 cents for the oats. The minimum carload rate on hay and oats happens to be the same, and so when the meat company paid \$47 which is the charge for carload hay they considered that the railroad company had received enough. Not so with the Smiths. So the railway people brought suit for \$48, which they charged them for the oats. They contended that oats and hay cannot be mixed in a car and that if they paid the freight on a full carload on the commodity bearing the highest tariff rate that the railroad ought to be satisfied.

HUNTINGTON RUNS ON REFORM PLATFORM

Huntington who has been petitioned by a number of the business men of The Dalles to run for mayor has announced his candidacy on the platform of a continuation of the policy of the present administration as regards the prevention of gambling, a strict enforcement of regulations regarding saloons and barrooms. A mass meeting will be held at the courthouse Friday evening, June 12, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of nominating candidates for mayor, city treasurer, four councilmen, and four water commissioners, one councilman from First ward, two from the Second and one water commissioner from each ward, and one water commissioner at large.

GETS \$2,000 FOR FALL FROM WAGON

M. M. Donahoe Successful in Suit Against Streetcar Company.

Two thousand dollars is the sum that the Portland Railway company must pay to M. M. Donahoe to compensate him for the injuries he received when he was thrown from his seat in an ice wagon that collided with a streetcar at Seventh and Burnside streets. Donahoe was riding with the driver and the car struck the rear end of the wagon, when it had almost cleared the track. The verdict was returned by a jury in Judge Cleland's court last evening. The trial had consumed over two days. The Portland railway alleged that the accident was due to the negligence of the wagon driver. It was claimed that the driver had gone upon the tracks and taken his chair, but had miscalculated the time in which he might cross. The plaintiff claimed that the speed of the car was excessive and that it should have been stopped before it collided with the wagon.
