REHEARING FOR CHARLES NICKEL

Convicted Editor and Leader Relieved by a Williamson Decision.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Medford, Or., June 12.—Charles Nickel, formerly publisher of the Southern Oregonian and for many years Democratic leader of southern Oregon, who was convicted three years ago of conspiracy to suborn perjury in the land fraud cases, with Francis J. Heney as prosecutor, and sentenced to 18 months' imprisonment at McNeil's Island, has received word from his attorney, Martin L. Pipes of Portland, that a rehearing of his case has been granted by the federal court of appeals.
Judge Hunt's decision had already been confirmed by this court, but the decision in Congressman Williamson's case by the federal supreme court was made the basis for an application for a rehearing. Williamson's case having been decided by the higher court after the court of appeals had passed on Nickel's case, Mr. Heney agreed not to oppose the motion for a rehearing.
Nickel was United States commissioner at Medford and was accused of having accepted perjured affidavits. He was convicted through the testimony of Miller and Kincaid, who turned state's evidence, and have each served a term at McNeil's Island.
Among the witnesses against Nickel was A. S. Bliton, publisher of a rival newspaper, and also a United States commissioner.

SALEM POSTOFFICE TO BE FIRST CLASS

Oregon's Peculiar Pre-Election Activities Largely Responsible.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., June 12.—Squire Farrar, postmaster at Salem, has received official notice from Washington that, beginning July 1, the postoffice at this place will be placed in the first class. Salem will then have the only first-class postoffice in Oregon outside of Portland.
The elevation of the Salem postoffice to first rank means a raise of \$100 in the postmaster's salary and a raise of

\$100 in the salary of the assistant. The salaries, beginning July 1, will be \$2,000 for the postmaster and \$1,500 for the first assistant.
In order to be placed in the list of first-class offices the postal receipts for the preceding year must reach \$40,000. For the year ending March 31, 1908, the receipts from this office were \$41,000. The large amount of state business arising out of the initiative and referendum measures that had to be mailed to every voter in the state is greatly responsible. There were 125,000 pamphlets, containing the initiative measures and arguments for and against each, which were sent out by the secretary of state. It required 3 cents to carry each of these pamphlets, which item alone was good for \$3,750. Other items contributed largely to the big receipts. During the past year the activities of the Salem board of trade have been greater than ever before, and several thousand pamphlets were mailed to eastern points, telling of the great opportunities in Oregon and the Willamette valley.
