ARTS AND CRAFTS ARE THE NEW TEST

Shades of Famous Paintings Reproduced in Silk Woven by Indefatigable Poor.

When the most beautiful silks, arranged in the most artistic blending of color and shade, are spread about a room to bring out the effects of paintings of several of the world's most famous artists, the beholder can only lean back in his chair and indulge in dreams which carry one to the little peasant homes in the mountains of Switzerland where the cottagers weave in simple fashion or in Vienna, where great factories have been established to carry on the silk industry that the great American dollar has made possible.

Such an impression is gained by a visit to Hervey's room at the Portland hotel. Myers has made his company famous for the advanced steps taken in the weaving of silks. The delicate blending of shades has become to be a separate art and when one stops to think of the beautiful coloring, the delicate blending of shades and the artistic harmony of his display, he can but believe that art for art's sake has become a regular millard's stock of cravats or milady's toilet.

Oil Paintings in Silk. On one side of a room is a masterpiece by M. Kamerlingh Onnes, the reproduction of the myriad colors depicted by Omur in oil. It is a wonderful display of silks. Myers calls them the Naere weave. To the uninitiated the name means nothing but even the most unlearned in fabrics the effect is conveyed in a most pleasing manner as he reveals in the luxuriance of the color tones.

And then Helieu, Tom Eason and Trouche are all represented by their best works. An Egyptian night by Tom Eason is portrayed in all its deep blue sky with the yellow fire effect in the richest of silks. It is showing the shading of the colors in a part of the painting. The soft canopy of heaven and the softer glow of the fire of the Arab camps as the nomads pass beneath the shadows of the sphinx and the pyramids are enriched in the soft shades of the silks Myers uses in his display and which are later made up into the beautiful cravats of some of the favored few.

About Ladies' Collars. Helieu is represented by two beautiful "heads." One surmounts a table covered with ladies' collars. And by the way, do you know the latest thing in ladies' collars? It is the Mary Tudor. Why Mary Tudor? Because the writer could think of nothing better to enshroud the neck of the coquette heroine of "When Knighthood Was in Flower" than the exquisite ruff of the Meline ruff displayed by Myers. In Paris they wear them so as to almost hide the ears. In America, they have modified them to accommodate the viciousness of the American girl, who needs to see what is going on about her.

And while writing about ladies' wear, a word about the fall waists. They will be of the tailors' and then you find sleeves out of the stylish effect that has made George Ade say they look as if they had been fitted by compressed air, so snugly do they surround the graceful outlines of the figure.

And of the predominating colors for fall. Hush! It is a secret. Myers says that his company's representative has just returned from Paris and is authorized by the statement that green, brown and blue—darker blue than has prevailed—will be the colors worn.

Furthermore Myers says that at present Paris and London are headed to red rose—vieux rose they call it in La Belle France. This old-time favorite has again caught the popular fancy and in the vernacular, has made good.

Silks That Tell a Story. But about Trouche's painting. It is called "Reverie," and depicts a beautiful girl sitting in a boat near a lake's quiet waters in the tranquil glow of the evening. And below are the silks. It is one of the most beautiful of brilliancy by looking at the display beneath Omur's study, he received the impression of quiet rest in the delicate tones of the silks as they seem to buoy the girl upon her journey of peaceful contemplation.

And there are hundreds of things about Myers' effects that one could spend much time and many words in describing but there is only one thing to be said that the general effect is enhanced by one display that attracts the eye. It is exactly the manner in which Myers wanted it to. That is a small showing of ruby red cravats, Red! When one thinks of red in neckwear he is apt to think of either the grossness of masculinity or femininity in the masculine. But the display dispels that. There is a deep glowing effect of ruby red that subdues all thoughts of everything save the richness of the quality.

Myers says of his Naere weave it was designed with the idea of catching the effects of the wonderful Tiffany glass without betraying the femininity of the ware. One who has made such a study his life's pursuit or who has been able to do it, has been able to educate himself by the spending route. Myers knows that Myers has succeeded, others can guess so. The word Naere is French for nearby. That is enough for an explanation. To those who have gazed at the wonderful color effects of mother-of-pearl, the Naere silks, which are woven in the same manner as the silks in their little mountain hamlets or cottages, are worthier of fairer criticism than even nature's wonderful creations in the shells.

Taxpayers of majority age will have the opportunity to vote for a director of school district No. 1 Monday afternoon between 3 and 6 o'clock.



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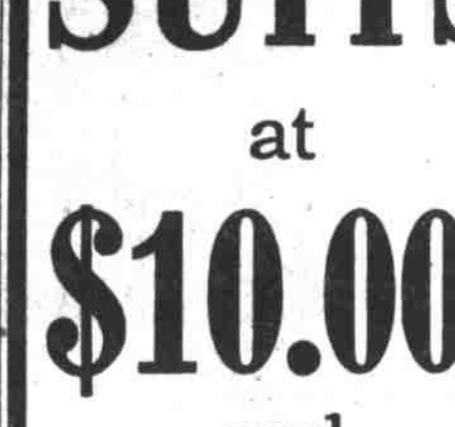
