

# LOCK SALOON DOORS TO ALL THIRSTY WOMEN

## Driscoll Measure, to Be Passed, Specifically Prohibits Saloonkeepers From Allowing Women to Enter Their Establishments for Any Purpose Whatever.

Councilman Driscoll's ordinance prohibiting saloonkeepers from allowing women to enter their places will be passed at the next meeting of the council and for the first time in the history of Portland, women will be forbidden to loiter in the resorts scattered about the city. The measure is an unusual one and it is believed to be the first one passed by any city in the state that will successfully evade the state constitution which does not restrict women from entering saloons.

While the ordinance does not forbid women from entering saloons it keeps them out by placing the responsibility upon the saloonkeeper. If he allows a woman to enter his place he can be convicted in the municipal court and fined not more than \$500 or sentenced to the city jail for not more than 90 days.

**Will Stop Evasion.**

At the city laws now stand the saloonkeepers evade the question of having women about their places by having connecting rooms where tables are placed and at which the women can drink. All attempts to have the practice discontinued failed owing to the jealousy existing among the saloonkeepers. They balked at any attempt

to have the women kept out unless they could be assured that every saloonkeeper in the city would adhere to the rule.

When the liquor license committee of the city council was hearing cases against saloonkeepers the root of all the trouble was laid to the fact that women were allowed to enter the place. Not one of the saloonkeepers held before the committee but allowed women in his saloon and the trouble which brought him before the committee arose over some differences in which a woman was involved. This fact caused the councilmen to seek a way in which the trouble could be eliminated.

**Measure Resurrected.**

Driscoll's ordinance followed and although it was introduced in February, has been allowed to lie in the committee until last Wednesday when Councilman Wills called it up. This at once threw the councilmen into a debate explaining why the measure had never been presented to the council for final action. Driscoll accused Councilman Vaughn of having held up the measure in the committee and inasmuch as Vaughn was not present no denial was forthcoming. It transpired from the talk that followed that Vaughn had asked to have the ordinance referred to the city attorney's office and that

he would present himself there and discuss the legality of the measure with City Attorney Kavanaugh.

City Attorney Kavanaugh stated at Wednesday's council meeting that Vaughn had never called and that he was about to send it back to the committee. This was ordered done and the committee was further ordered to report the measure for passage at the next council meeting. That the ordinance will pass seems certain and had it not been held up by dilatory tactics women would have been prohibited from entering saloons for the past four months. The section referring to the manner in which the saloonkeepers are prohibited from allowing women to enter their saloons follows:

**Door Shut Tight.**

"No licensed liquor dealer in the city of Portland, nor the owner or proprietor of any saloon, barroom, drinking shop, or place where intoxicating liquors are kept for sale, or sold at retail, either by himself or by any servant, employee or agent, shall permit or suffer any female person to enter for the purpose of drinking or buying any intoxicating liquors, or to remain or loiter, for any purpose, in or about any room, box, booth, alcove or place adjoining and connected in any way with such saloon, barroom, drinking shop, or place where intoxicating liquors are kept for sale or sold at retail, or served; provided, that the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to any open and public restaurant or dining-room.

When the court passed sentence, Simpson, who was already weeping, staggered and almost fell, but was steadied by the arm of Sheriff Stevens, who sprang to his side.

the members of his family were bitter in their accusations against him. About one month ago, after his conviction, his wife died and he deeded all his property to his children. Fatherless and unhonored by those who might otherwise have paid reverence to his name, he goes to the penitentiary today or tomorrow to begin serving his time.

Simpson's attorney made a motion for a new trial before judgment was pronounced, but this was denied. No appeal will be taken. Simpson was arrested last fall, but the case was delayed through an error in filing the information, making it necessary to dismiss one charge after a jury had been sworn, and to file a new information.
