White Ribboners are not forgetting that the temperance cause is broader than the state of Oregon. We had scarcely ceased our jubilation over the news that Illinois with its breweries and distilleries, its thousands of saloons with their political power, had voted 94 per cent of its territory dry when the swift dispatches bore us the news that North Carolina had won

state prohibition by a tremendous majority. This news had not ceased to be real news when our own state elections showed Oregon well up with the dry procession with 21 prohibition counties.

We have been especially happy to find that with the exception of some like precincts "dry" territory has been chosen to remain "dry" and more to give a larger majority for prohibition in the last election.

The time will come when many who voted against this manifestly just measure will recall with mortification that they had not voted for it. In starting this cause at this time the National Federation of Clubs, to sit with the recent conference of notable officials in Washington to discuss with them matters of public and national policy. The time is swiftly coming when the nation will have the benefits of the "mothering" it so much needs. We are glad to note the Governor Hoch of Kansas has recently appointed Mrs. Mitchell to the office of probate judge to succeed her husband, who died in office. Hon. Seaborn Wright of Georgia was given an ovation recently upon the occasion of his argument for state prohibition before the Louisiana house of representatives. The Daily Picayune, of New Orleans, whose inclination toward "the trade" in the past is so well known, in referring to this event, says: "What does this mean? Is Louisiana about to fall aroused, were going to work in dead earnest to do the only logical thing a patriotic people can do—to exterminate the sale and manufacture of all intoxicating beverages."
