

POSTOFFICE REFERENDUM CENTER SOON HELD BACK

After July 1 Office in This City Will Disburse Moneys of Department to All of the Other Offices in the State.

Change in Election Date Means Measures Passed by Legislature Next January Cannot Be Voted on for Nearly Two Years.

Portland has been made the headquarters of the principal disbursing office of all the postoffices in Oregon. The new order which was made public by Postmaster John W. Minto of Portland yesterday is to become effective July 1. This will affect all the presidential offices throughout the state as well as the fourth-class offices. The system now in use provides that all the postmasters at the different points make remittances to an assistant United States treasurer at the subtreasury in San Francisco. When the new ruling of the postoffice department becomes effective it will result in several hundred thousand dollars being handled in Portland each year that has heretofore gone direct to the subtreasury in San Francisco. When the remittances of Oregon's postoffices begin pouring into Portland after July 1 additional clerks will be employed in the finance department at the postoffice. After being counted and entered on the accounting books the money will be placed in the regular bank used as a depository by the Portland office. Another new postal order that will be beneficial to Portland and which will add to the centralization of the postoffice business in the state's metropolis is that regarding the payment of the salaries of the rural free delivery carriers of all divisions. Under the new plan checks on the subtreasury at San Francisco will be sent to the carriers from the office of Postmaster Minto each month. This order also becomes effective July 1. The war pensioners of the government are also paid in the same way.
