Particulars of The Oregon Journal's Third Annual Educational Contest Which Opens June 22nd

In announcing the particulars of its third annual educational contest, which opens June 22, The Oregon Journal believes that it is sending a message of joy to many ambitious boys and girls and young men and young women throughout the Pacific northwest. The glory of winning a free scholarship in one of the leading educational institutions in itself will stimulate many to work with untiring energy in order to gain the laurel. Such a golden opportunity as The Journal offers energetic young people with educational aspirations is denied hundreds of thousands of others in less favored sections of the United States, who look with envy on the good fortune within the reach of the youth of our own prosperous country on the grand Pacific slope.

GRAND INCENTIVES OFFERED.

In addition to the numerous valuable scholarships in institutions of the winners' own choice, cash awards ranging from \$25 to \$150 will be distributed among the lucky winners of free scholarships which will pay all, or help to pay, their incidental expenses while attending college. Even those who do not win scholarships or cash awards will be well remunerated for their work, for they will be paid good cash commissions on all new subscriptions they receive. The commissions alone will well pay for the time spent during vacation.

MEET MUST BE ON WORK.

To succeed in any undertaking a person's mind must be on his work, otherwise he will lag and lose interest and become discouraged before he gets a good start. A good start is half the race. While live, energetic boys and girls never despair of ultimate success, even when for some cause or other they are so handicapped that there is little chance for them to be victorious, still their determination is so strong that their will power dominates over their weak inclinations and they never let up in their efforts to attain their fixed purpose. It is such young, strong minds as these that succeed in life, and these are the caliber of young men and women who are sought daily by leading business men, professional men, manufacturers,

turers, financial and other institutions for positions of trust and positions that command high salaries. Numberless men and women seeking employment fall simply because they haven't got the very essentials required for remunerative situations. While this contest will extend over

a period of three months, it is well to remember that if you are anxious to procure a scholarship free it is advisable to enter at once without waiting an hour or a day.

The scholarships, cash awards and cash commissions herewith set forth are self-explanatory. It is now up to you boys and girls to enter the race with vim, and ever keep in mind the motto, "Nil desperandum."

THE WAY IT IS DONE

Each and every subscriber to any issue of The Journal will be entitled to vote for a contestant according to the length of time they pay in advance for their subscription. A schedule of votes allowed on every issue, for different periods, is published today.

Every contestant should commence at once to hustle for subscribers to The Journal, bearing in mind that new subscribers count many more votes than old subscribers, for it is only through an increase in circulation that The Journal will receive returns for such a large outlay of cash and scholarships.

The public will be kept advised by publication from time to time as to the standing of the different contestants and the votes to their credit.

Instruction in canvassing or conducting your campaign for subscribers and votes will be given to any contestant who applies to the contest manager.

CASH AWARDS

In addition to the scholarship awards The Journal will make the following cash awards to help defray expenses of the students who may poll the largest vote:

The above sums in cash will be paid contestants immediately after the close of the contest, in the order of their standing. Cash commissions will be allowed on all new subscribers, in addition to the cash awards, so that a contestant may earn money every day during the contest.

The Journal has been divided into four districts, as follows:

- Multnomah county, Oregon.
- Williamette Valley (as far south as Eugene).
- Southern Oregon (all south of Eugene).
- Eastern Oregon.

A liberal measure of votes is allowed for subscriptions to the semi-weekly edition of The Journal to favor contestants working in districts where the population is scattered. The voting schedule is so keyed and the field is so divided, that a contestant living in the country or on a rural route has an equal advantage with the contestant living in the city of Portland. The young people living in the country have this advantage over their city rivals: they enjoy a larger personal acquaintance.

HOW THEY ARE DISTRIBUTED.
The candidate who at the close of the contest has the largest number of votes, irrespective of locality or district, will have first choice of all scholarships.

RATES AND CREDITS.
Prepaid subscriptions, only, count for votes in the Oregon Journal contest, many more points allowed for new subscriptions than for payments on old subscriptions. The same number of votes are allowed whether the paper goes to the subscriber by mail or by
