SUSPECTS BOYS OF ROBBERING HIS STORE.

The general merchandise store of O. Giesinger at Milwaukie was broken into Saturday night by burglars who were easily satisfied. They took only a few dollars worth of candy, cigars and notions. Mr. Giesinger thinks he knows who are the culprits.

A close watch is being kept upon the boys suspected of robbing the store, and if they can be proved guilty of the theft an example will be made of them.

Chocolate Company Wins Suit.

At the June term of the United States circuit court for the western district of Virginia, held at Staunton, Va., on the 2d inst., Judge McDowell handed down a decree in the case of Walter Baker & Co., Ltd., vs. W. H. Baker of Winchester, Va.

It will be remembered that W. H. Baker of Winchester, by his name and initials, sought to imitate the goods of Walter Baker & Co., Ltd., and in particular to pass off his chocolate as "Baker's Chocolate," or a kind of "Baker's Chocolate."

By earlier decrees in this case W. H. Baker of Winchester was forbidden to labor or describe his goods as "Baker's Cocoa" or "Baker's Chocolate," and was required to print prominently on the wrapper of his chocolate the name of the master to determine the amount which Walter Baker & Co., Ltd., were entitled to recover by reason of the infringement. The master assessed this amount at \$52,460.84.

The decree just entered confirms the master's findings and orders that Walter Baker & Co., Ltd., recover from W. H. Baker of Winchester the above sum of \$52,460.84, together with their costs, and further orders that the commissioner's fees for taking the accounting, amounting to \$2,350, be paid by W. H. Baker of Winchester, Va.

CHRISTIANIZE EARTH IN ONE GENERATION

Dr. Brougier Tells What Absolute Devotion to Cause Would Do.

In spite of the warm weather here there was a large crowd present at the White Temple last night to hear Dr. Brougier's views on the subject, "Why Do Not People Mind Their Own Business?"

The large chorus choir under the direction of Mr. Malcolm Martin, a noted soloist from Minneapolis, Minn., is doing splendid work.

A large platform is being built today to accommodate 50 young people who expect to join this chorus.

Rev. Herbert Spencer Johnson, pastor of the famous Warren avenue Baptist church of Boston, will preach, and tomorrow night Dr. Brougier will speak on the subject, "Man's Curiosity."

Dr. Brougier also especially emphasized the individual responsibility of each Christian. "We have got to stand face to face," he said, "with the fact that if we were dead in sin, even so and I you. The strategic point in all Christian service is in every one of us assuming the individual responsibility that Jesus Christ has placed upon him or her."

There are two reasons for people not minding their own business, one, they haven't any business and the other is, they haven't any mind. But we are here on the ground of business, and we must use every faculty that God has given us to lead people to Christ.

It is not the Christian's business to go about finding things to condemn. It is our business—my business and your business—to come in touch with our fellow-men, not to condemn them but to help them to know Jesus Christ as their savior.

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BROWNING PLAY INTERPRETED BY THE COLLEGIATE ALUMNAE

"Colombe's Birthday," by Browning, last night went on record as the third annual play given by the collegiate alumnae.

The Empire theatre was well filled and the play was enjoyed. The superior work of Miss Rose Rytting, who had trained; them was plainly in evidence in the easy grouping of the characters about the stage in general, stage behavior, the work was better than in previous years.

Mrs. Ralph W. Wilbur played the title role, and though she read her lines too low to be heard beyond the front seats, she read them intelligently.

Miss Margaret Naab, the attendant of Colombe, played her part in a pretty and likeable manner. Miss Ethel Wakeman, playing the pretender, had the best voice and enunciation of any in the company, and her green costume hid a rich appearance.

The minor characters were well sustained. Miss Frank Towles played well a thankless part, in which heavy contralto voice was her chief requisite.

Miss Lois Fear had a more "real looking" gown than any other of the women characters. Miss Edith Goddard as the pretender's confidant also played a wicked part well, but the effect of the contrasting also of the two friends caused a good many titters.

Miss Daisy Mansfield, Miss Louise G. Abbott, Miss Frances G. H. Miss Lois Fear and Miss Cora Shaver all played more or less important parts as lords and ladies.

In the court dance good training was shown. The Norton orchestra played the incidental music.

With all due respect to Browning and his intellectual admirers, the Browning play proved a little heavy for off-hand interpretation and understanding by the audience, and especially when interpreted by women only.
