VIRGIL GARVIN IS FANNED OUT

Former Great Pitcher Dies of Consumption in California Hospital.

Fresno, Cal., June 17.—Virgil Garvin, formerly one of the best known ball players in this country, is dead of consumption, induced by alcoholic excess. Garvin died at the county hospital last night, practically penniless.

Thousands of fans throughout the northwest are familiar with the name and fame of Virgil Garvin, pitcher and not one of them but deplores the fate of a man who could probably have been the greatest pitcher in any league had he abstained from liquor. Garvin was a member of the Portland team in 1905, the first year that Walter McCredie became identified with the management. McCredie signed him as pitcher and he made a good record with Portland. His drinking propensities led the local management to free him the following year.

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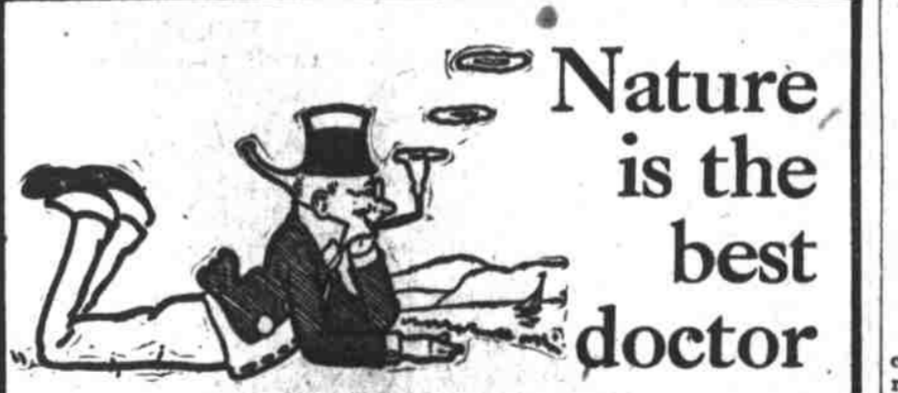
