CONFERENCE AT THE BREAKERS

Y. M. C. A. Workers Fill Busy Days With Profitable Work and Play.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Long Beach, Wash., June 17.—Owing to the lack of service on the Ilwaco railroad Rev. John Dean of Seattle was unable to reach the Y. M. C. A. conference in time to address the platform meeting yesterday. In consequence the lifework meeting was transferred to the hour of the platform meeting. Rev. Folsom of Forest Grove addressed the conference on "The Responsibility of Christian Young Men to the Pacific Northwest," taking as his theme the call to the ministry.
Fred Butler of Seattle sang for the conference.
The lifework meeting of Monday evening was addressed by Harry W. Arnold of New York city, on "The Open Doors." The theme was the opportunity of the Y. M. C. A. secretarieships for the investment of one's life.
The afternoon of Monday was spent in a tennis tournament for the championship of the conference.
The conference will take a "hike" Thursday to the lighthouse. On Friday will be held the big track meet of the conference. There will be 13 events and the winner of each event will receive a Greek laurel.
The Conference Reviewed.
The conference opened at the Breakers hotel Saturday evening for 10 days. Nearly all of the colleges and universities of Oregon and Washington and the state schools of Idaho and Montana are represented here. About 100 delegates are registered.
The first platform address was delivered by Dr. La Flamme of Toronto, Bibly, returned from India. His theme was "The Holy Spirit in the College Man's Life." He also delivered the address at the lifework meeting in the evening, presenting the call to the foreign mission field.
H. W. Arnold of New York city, international secretary of the Y. M. C. A., delivered the morning platform address. He took as his subject, "The Problem of Self-control." His theme was that every man should have a pure, definite purpose in life.
The Monday morning platform address was delivered by Dr. La Flamme on "The Moral Education of Man." His theme was that the place for heroic work today is in the foreign field and not on the battlefields. He gave glimpses of the terrible conditions in India and demonstrated the need of workers.
The Day's Work in Conference.
The program is the same in outline for each day. In the morning hours Bible study, mission study, discussion of association problems and the platform address follow closely in order, with a short recreation before the afternoon sessions are given over to recreation and athletic events. The evening is taken up with delegation meetings, the lifework address and the second platform address of the day.
Six Bible study classes have been organized under conference leaders and three mission classes.
An athletic committee has been appointed to arrange athletic contests. There will be several baseball contests during the conference, and, in addition, a track meet and tennis tournament.

MILL AT WALDPOR IN OPERATION AGAIN

Newport, Or., June 17.—The Waldport lumber mill is running again, after being shut down for over three weeks. The company has just been incorporated under the name of the Waldport Lumber company, with August Fisher as president, Harry Stevenson vice-president and George Witt as secretary-treasurer and manager.
Wittner returned Friday to Waldport from Portland, where he had been negotiating for starting up again, and Saturday the mill began to hum. New machinery has been bought and is now on the ground, and through the old machinery is being used at present it is expected that the new mill will be installed and running by the middle of next month. It is planned to put in a planing mill within six months and to enlarge the plant greatly.
The single mill will be started in about a week. The company is incorporated for \$50,000, which \$40,000 is subscribed and paid up.

Memorial Hall

SCRAMBLE FOR NEW OFFICES

Republicans and Democrats Fighting Over Executives of Hood River County.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Hood River, Or., June 17.—Inability of Republicans and Democrats to come to an agreement as to who shall fill the offices of Hood River county is placing many candidates in the field. The original appointees selected by the Democrats, consisting of S. F. Blythe for county judge, G. D. Culbertson for county clerk, W. C. Brock for county treasurer, L. E. Morse for sheriff, and M. M. Hill for county commissioner, will, it is said by the leaders of that party here, be the ones recommended for appointment by the governor. They state that they will be satisfied with these appointments, which represent half of the offices. A number of Republicans, however, think they ought to be given the county clerk as well as some of the other offices, and petitions are now being circulated for J. M. Hunt and D. S. Sikes for county clerk, J. M. Schmelzer for county treasurer, J. L. Hershner for assessor, B. F. Coad for county school superintendent, A. A. Blowers for county judge and J. E. Nichols for coroner. In addition, W. Onthank, Prohibitionist, would like the office of county clerk, and there are said to be several other candidates for county judge.
Petitions for all the candidates have been liberally signed by residents of the new county, and a delegation representing the choice of the Democrats in the matter will visit Governor Chamberlain to press their cause in a few days. It is not expected that the Republicans will send a delegation to the governor in the interests of their candidates. They believe, however, that the governor will give them a share of the appointments on account of the fact that he has appointed many Republicans since he has been in office. According to the provisions of the law, appointments must be made by July 1, which is the date specified in the bill for the creation of the county.
