

SIDE SHOWMAN GETS BIG MONEY

Wife Likes Salary but Objects Being Made Part of Menagerie.

That her husband, manager of a sideshow in a circus, earns two or three times as much as the ordinary bank president and nearly half as much as the president of the United States, is the statement made by Mrs. Leona Shannon in a complaint for divorce filed in the circuit court. She places his income at \$2,000 per month.

Mrs. Shannon does not specify the exact entertainment her husband furnishes for the multitude. The imagination is left to surmise whether he represents the "cats em alive" show, or exhibits the resuscitated man. Anyway her complaint lays stress on the \$2,000 per month income that Walter A. Shannon, the man in the case, is alleged to receive. She says he has \$19,000 on hand and she wants an allowance in gross for her alimony. She leaves the amount to the satisfaction of the court.

Mrs. Shannon says her showman has choked and abused her on numerous occasions and called her bad names. She wants to resume her maiden name of Leona Perkins. She was married in Vancouver, Washington, in December, 1907.

Alleging that he deserted her three times in one year, Mrs. Leona King has entered suit for separation from Clarence H. King, to whom she was married in Pocatello, Idaho, in 1904. Once he went away and stayed three months, she says. The next time he was two months absent. The third time he failed to come back at all, the last desertion being November 20, 1907. She asks for divorce on the ground of cruelty, alleging that her husband cursed and choked her on occasions too numerous to mention.

On the ground of desertion, David Koch is seeking divorce from Laura A. Koch. They were married in Allentown, Pa., in 1894, and he alleges that she deserted him in May, 1907, taking the furniture with her.

through navigation on the river has ceased until the floods pass. There is an immense amount of water in the mountains, and the Columbia will be swelled by every stream.

The navigation companies of the Pend d'Oreille river have just completed two new steamboats, larger than any previously operated there, and are planning to run these boats between Newport and the Metairie mines, as soon as the waters subside sufficiently to permit them to run safely through the box canyon.

The Mammoth and Morning mines have purchased a 200-ton concentrating mill and the machinery is piled up at Newport, the railroad terminus, waiting for the boats to run to Metaline. Practically all business on the river and depending on the stream for movement of tonnage is at a standstill on account of the high waters.

BUY HEMLOCK TRACT FOR NEW PAPER MILL

The Hawley Pulp & Paper company has purchased about 4,000 acres of spruce and hemlock timber in Wahk-

kum county, Wash., with the intention of having it logged for the pulp mill to be built at Oregon City.

The tract had been run over for years without attention from anyone until the demand for spruce and hemlock for paper pulp drew interest to the vast sources of raw material.

The timber when cut can be towed to Oregon City in rafts or carried by rail.

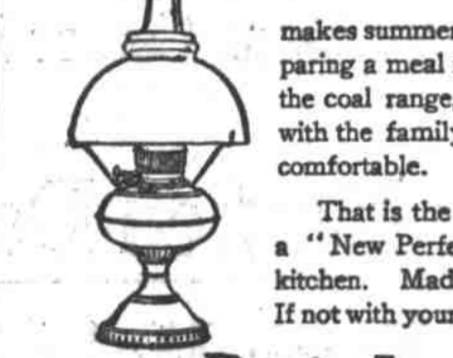

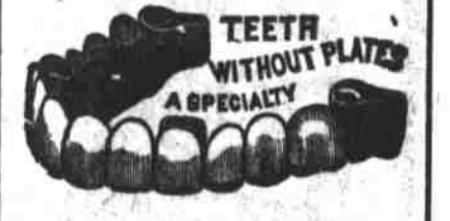
