# JOURNAL'S CONTEST

Third Annual Scholarship Competition Opens Tomorrow  
—Students Delighted With Opportunity to Win  
Free Higher Education.

## WISE BOYS AND GIRLS WILL GET EARLY START

If You Do Not Fully Understand Conditions Consult Journal Contest Manager.

The wise boys and girls and young men and young women who intend entering The Journal's scholarship contest which opens tomorrow will not lose any time in the work of securing subscriptions for the Oregon Daily, Sunday and Semi-Weekly Journal. The subscriptions secured by the contestants will alone determine the distribution of scholarships and cash awards. The Journal has no say whatever as to who shall get the choice of scholarships, and the accompanying cash awards as explained herewith. The contestant securing the largest number of votes has the choice of the big list of scholarships. The second choice of scholarships goes to the contestant who secures the largest number of votes in the district which does not get the first choice. The same rule carries right through the whole list until all the scholarships and cash awards are exhausted. In this way all have an equal chance, no matter how small or thin settled a district is. The young person who feels discouraged enough to despair of winning a coveted prize will be surprised the effect a determined will will have on his or her efforts. Those surmounting obstacles will have more confidence in themselves, and after a successful battle with handicaps they will find an easy way to succeed with any undertaking. Make an early start and work hard, for it's worth while.

### THE WAY IT IS DONE

Each and every subscriber to any issue of The Journal will be entitled to vote for a contestant according to the length of time they pay in advance for their subscription. A schedule of votes allowed on every issue, for different periods, is published today.

Every contestant should commence at once to hustle for subscribers to The Journal, bearing in mind that new subscribers count many more votes than old subscribers, for it is only through an increase in circulation that The Journal will receive returns for such a large outlay of cash and scholarships. The public will be kept advised by publication from time to time as to the standing of the different contestants and the votes to their credit. Instruction in canvassing or conducting your campaign for subscribers and votes will be given to any contestant who applies to the contest manager.

**EQUAL CHANCE FOR ALL.**  
For the purpose of awarding the scholarships and cash prizes, the field of The Journal has been divided into four districts, as follows:  
Multnomah county, Oregon.  
Willamette Valley (as far south as Eugene).  
Southern Oregon (all south of Eugene).  
Eastern Oregon.

A liberal measure of votes is allowed for subscriptions to the semi-weekly edition of The Journal to favor contestants working in districts where the population is scattered. The voting schedule is so keyed and the field is so divided, that a contestant living in the country or on a rural route has an equal advantage with the contestant living in the city of Portland. The young people living in the country have this advantage over their city rivals: they enjoy a larger personal acquaintance.

**HOW THEY ARE DISTRIBUTED.**  
The candidate who at the close of the contest has the largest number of votes, irrespective of locality or district, will have first choice of all scholarships.  
The second choice will fall to the contestant of highest vote in the district which does not get the first choice. The third choice will fall to the contestant of highest vote in a district which does not get either the first or second choice. The fourth choice will fall to the contestant of highest vote

in the district which does not get the first, second or third choice. The remaining scholarships will be given out to contestants according to their standing, alternating between the districts. The cash prizes will be given out similarly. He or she, however, will keep the cash commissions earned during the contest for new subscribers.

**RATES AND CREDITS.**  
Prepaid subscriptions, only, count for votes in the Oregon Journal contest, many more points allowed for new subscriptions than for payments on old subscriptions. The same number of votes are allowed whether the paper goes to the subscriber by mail or by carrier. In order to procure votes on an old subscription, the advance payment shall be made for not less than three months. Votes are allowed on new subscriptions, for advance payments for one month or more, an outline of the voting values being as follows:

months: By mail, \$3.75; by carrier, \$3.90; and so on.  
Twelve months: By mail, \$7.50; by carrier, \$7.80; votes allowed, if new, 2,000; if old, 1,000.  
**DAILY EDITION WITHOUT SUNDAY.**  
One month: Price by mail, 50 cents; delivered, 45 cents; votes allowed, if new, 40; if old, none.  
Two months: Price by mail, \$1; delivered, 90 cents; votes allowed, if new, 100; if old, none.  
Three months: By mail, \$1.40; delivered, \$1.35; votes allowed, if new, 200; if old, 90.  
Four months: By mail, \$1.75; by carrier, \$1.80; votes allowed, if new, 250; if old, 110.  
Five months: By mail, \$2.80; by carrier, \$2.85; votes allowed, if new, 300; if old, 140.  
Six months: By mail, \$2.75; by carrier, \$2.80; votes allowed, if new, 400; if old, 200; and so on.  
Twelve months: By mail, \$5; by carrier, \$5.20; votes allowed, if new, 1,000; if old, 500.  
**SUNDAY JOURNAL ONLY.**  
Twelve months: Price by mail or by carrier, \$2.50; votes allowed, if a new subscriber, 400; if an old subscriber, 150.  
Six months: By mail or by carrier, \$1.25; votes allowed, if new, 175; if old, 75.  
Three months: By mail or by carrier, 65 cents; votes allowed, if new, 50; if old, 25.  
**SEMI-WEEKLY EDITION.**  
This edition of The Journal is sent to subscribers by mail only. Price for 12 months, \$1.50; votes allowed, if new, 500; if old, 250. Six months: Price, 75 cents; votes allowed, if new, 200; if old, 100.

## CASH AWARDS

In addition to the scholarship awards The Journal will make the following cash awards to help defray expenses of the students who may poll the largest vote:

The above sums in cash will be paid contestants immediately after the close of the contest, in the order of their standing. Cash commissions will be allowed on all new subscribers, in addition to the cash awards, so that a contestant may earn money every day during the contest.
