

DIVORCE VERSUS GREATER NAVY

Mrs. William H. Taft Declares Home Ties Are More Important Than Ships.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, June 23.—That divorce is the greatest evil of the American nation today is the statement made here by Mrs. William Howard Taft, wife of the Republican presidential nominee, and all society is agog over some very pointed remarks made by the wife of the man just now uppermost in the public mind.

"Yes, if it were in my power, divorce would be stopped altogether," said Mrs. Taft. "Of course there are cases where separation might be morally warranted, but there should be no remarriage allowed. The laxity of our divorce laws is a menace to the very moral fiber of our nation."

"To begin with, if divorces are to be granted at all, there should be a uniform divorce law for all states—for the nation—and then there would be no opportunity to evade it as is being done at the present time."

"We might build up the greatest navy in the world so we might have the good will of every ruler of the earth; we might have a credit and commerce unparalleled in the history of nations; but when within the homes of our country there is a moral laxity and family ties can be broken up in a twinkling through a process of law that is looked upon as a matter of course, just as one would file a will or a deed, then there is a greater danger to the country than could come from a war with foreign nations and the most useful life for any woman," she said.

COSSACKS IN PERSIA

Russians Surround House of Parliament and Demand Surrender of Political Prisoners—Eight Hundred Rebels Massacred by Shah's Troops.

Berlin, June 23.—A dispatch received here from Teheran states that the shah's troops have massacred 800 of the revolutionists, with insignificant losses to their own ranks.

Teheran, June 23.—The crisis of the Persian troubles was reached today when a company of Cossacks surrounded the house of parliament and demanded the surrender of a number of political prisoners. The greatest excitement prevailed and it is feared that the shah may be killed by the disaffected portion of the army, which has joined the revolutionists in open revolt.

The demand made upon the house of parliament was met by shots and several Cossacks were killed. Reinforcements arrived shortly afterward with artillery and heavy firing followed. The parliament houses are entirely surrounded by troops and it is feared that the outbreak may result in the overthrow of the shah, who is a voluntary prisoner in the summer palace, guarded by troops.

Several plots against the life of the ruler have been discovered and it is said that he lives in abject fear of death, suspecting that his own guard may contain men in the pay of the constitutional party.

Berlin, June 23.—Authoritative advice received here says that the massacre at Teheran, the capital of Persia, was the bloodiest and most horrible in the history of the country, followed by a reign of terror is sweeping over the provinces.

The carnage was the direct result of the order of the shah, commanding the troops to fire and the imperial artillery to let loose its batteries on the crowds surrounding the palace. Hundreds were mowed down by the volleys which swept the grounds. This horrible slaughter was followed by free-for-all butchery. Women and children were not spared, but were murdered by the frenzied soldiers and their bodies outraged and mutilated.

Eighteen of the reform leaders, supposed to have been active in the revolution, were dragged before the shah, who ordered them to be shot at once. The mob attacked the soldiers and seized the prisoners and the leaders were literally chopped to pieces by the heavy swords of the guardsmen before the 18 condemned men were recovered and executed according to the imperial edict. The troops are headed by reactionary leaders, who encouraged the slaughter. Whole sections of the city are given over to lust and loot and the most revolting state of affairs prevails.

Dispatches say the most demoralizing feature of the situation is the lack of organization and the casual nature of the carnage, which late in the afternoon became promiscuous and was carried on by men who appear to have had only the lust for human blood, having lost their minds in the terrible massacre at the palace. It is predicted that the murderous and lawless state can result only in the overthrow of the shah, who is said to have been in constant fear of his life for days. It is supposed that he was driven to such desperate action by the fear that had preyed on his mind until he was temporarily mad.

REBELLION IN WEST SUMATRA

Heavy Losses by Both Natives and Dutch in Recent Battles.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Hague, June 23.—As a protest against excessive taxation the natives of West Sumatra are in violent rebellion and the fighting extends throughout the provinces. The East Indies have not seen such a furious uprising in a long time and the Dutch government is preparing to remove the women and children from the sections affected and from those into which it is feared the rebellion will spread.

Three battles are reported from Lake Singkrah and heavy losses are said to have been sustained by both the natives and the Dutch.

At Kajostan the rebels were beaten and 20 are known to have been killed. The natives won a victory at Hadang and the Dutch a Dutch patrol was routed, after severe loss.

SEVEN THOUSAND IN ENCAMPMENT

Regulars With Guards of Five States at American Lake in August.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Olympia, Wash., June 23.—Seven thousand regulars and national guardsmen, consisting of troops from the Department of the Columbia and the national guards of Washington and Oregon, will go into camp at American Lake, near Tacoma, for 10 days, beginning August 2. The guardsmen will number about 2,500. Washington's present strength is 800 and Oregon's 1,400. The encampment will continue until July 15 and it is expected the strength will be increased 25 per cent.

The Washington and Oregon national guards will leave the encampment August 12 but the federal troops will remain at the national guards of Idaho, Montana and North Dakota will go into camp with them a few days later. The national guards of these states at present is about 1,500 but this also will be increased about 25 per cent before the date of the encampment.

It was learned that he complained of pains before the Chicago convention and suffered during the session at which he was nominated for the second highest office in the nation.

Dr. T. E. Carter, who is in charge of the case, held a conference by long distance telephone with Dr. Finney, of Baltimore, who treated Sherman when he suffered a previous attack. Finney is understood to have been summoned.

The telegram sent by ex-Governor Myron T. Herrick to the Sherman family at Utica was the first intimation they received of his serious condition. The great strain of the convention and the trip to Cincinnati has greatly aggravated his case.
