RECEIVERSHIP ENDS

Outlet Clothing Co. Will Start Big Reorganization Sale Thursday. The Outlet Clothing Co., which was compelled to go into the hands of a receiver by their creditors some time ago, have finally freed themselves from the yoke of the receiver and creditors.

Mr. J. S. Copland, the receiver, with kindest regard and respect, and are greatly indebted to him for his efforts in accomplishing an almost impossible task in raising that enormous sum of one hundred and nine thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars. It was, of course, very disastrous to the Outlet Clothing Co., but at a meeting held by the stockholders last night it was fully decided to reorganize and replenish the loss sustained during the greatest receiver's sale ever held in Portland.

It was also agreed that so soon as possible they must get rid of all goods now on hand. In order to do this they will, of course, have to undersell the receiver to a great extent. They still have a big stock on hand. Many suits, pants, hats and shoes that were in the basement and were never placed on sale will be brought upstairs and shall be sold as quickly as possible at still greater loss in order to make room for fall goods. It is to everyone's interest to keep their eyes on the Outlet Clothing Co. This reorganization sale promises to be a gigantic affair.
