

SENATOR RETURNS FROM WASHINGTON AND CHICAGO BUT DODGES QUESTIONS

"I am home to rest and not to talk politics. I do not intend to talk any politics until this fall, and then I intend to discuss national politics and not state, and please put it just that way."

Thus does Charles W. Fulton, senator of Oregon, friend of W. H. Taft, and whipmaster of the credentials committee of the national Republican convention, brush aside the questions of the future and enter into the vices of the old stamping ground at Astoria. Senator Fulton is home from Washington and Chicago to gambol on the green, as it were, and publicly speaking at least, has forgotten that there was or is such a thing as a senatorial election at which the people of the state have directed and the legislature is going to give credentials to a new senator from Oregon.

Senator Returns From Washington and Chicago but Dodges Questions.
The senator reached Portland last night from Chicago and greeted his old friends who had learned of his arrival at the Imperial. He told them all about the convention, whopped it up for Taft and said that the big man from Ohio would make an easy meal of the man from Nebraska if they ever get together as it seemed certain they would. He said he was much gratified that the jetty at the Columbia's mouth had done such good work and hoped it would continue to scour—his subject, possibly, in fact, on every subject except state politics, and his prospective cabinet position. On these subjects he shied like a timorous colt.

Turns Down State Questions.
"Senator, will you be a candidate for reelection by the legislature next January, or would you accept the office if it were tendered you?" The question was handed up over the railing as the senator stood on the platform smiling at the baited group. Then he made the speech which opened this tale.

"I will be back in Portland some day and we will have a long talk," he added as an afterthought. Then he made the wheels begin to move.

"How about that cabinet position if Taft is elected?" The question hurled against the retreating car, but the senator only smiled, waved his hand, and smiling, vanished in the direction of Astoria and his summer's rest.
