Second Inmate.

He was appointed assistant district attorney of Erie county in 1883, and held the office for three years. At this time strenuous efforts were being made to bring the civil war to a close.

Nominee for President.

In the autumn of 1881 he was nominated Democratic candidate for mayor of Buffalo and was elected by a majority of 8,830, the largest ever given to a candidate in that city.

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Mr. Cleveland received a popular plurality of 29,810 over Mr. Harrison. Cleveland's second administration was simply a continuation of the policy that ruled him during his first term.
