PARADES TO BE SPECIAL CARDS

Livestock Exhibit of Country Club Meet to Be Attractively Featured.

One of the spectacular features of the Pacific national meet to be held by the Country Club and Livestock association here this fall will be the livestock parade in connection with the show ring exhibition. The management hopes to popularize the stock exhibit from the very start and through a system, will give every rise the

tries in the various divisions and later inspecting the prize winners. For the show ring and exhibition purposes, the Country Club and Livestock association will, for this year, erect a big tent arena with a seating capacity of several thousand, in which the exhibitions and judging will take place. Aside from this the parades, which are a prominent feature of livestock exhibitions, will take place upon the large one-mile oval on which the harness horse races will be run off. The plan is to hold a parade of each division at the time the judges are making their awards in another division. The preliminary parade will include all entries qualifying under the system of classification adopted. For instance, on the first day, there will be a parade of the entries in the four divisions, horses, cattle, swine, sheep and goats, around the one-mile track. Following the judging in any one of these divisions the prize winners will be exhibited in front of the grandstand. This system will be continued throughout the week, and on the last day the prize and trophy winners in all divisions and classes will be conducted around the track in one monster procession.

The Union Meat company, which is now planning for the erection of a mammoth packing plant on the peninsula, has arranged to conduct an expedition campaign throughout the entire northwest in the interest of the livestock exposition. Officials of the company have instructed their purchasing agents to use their best efforts among the stock men in the territory which they cover with a view of securing representative entries in all divisions and classes included in the week's show card. These purchasing agents cover all of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, British Columbia and portions of California, Nevada and Utah. It is expected that their missionary work will produce splendid results.
