

HARVARD BEATS YALE'S OARSMEN

Blue Stroke Collapses From Nervousness and Eli Gives Up.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New London, Conn., June 26.—Griswold, the Yale stroke, collapsed from ultra-nervousness in the great Harvard-Yale boat race on the Thames yesterday evening and the blue eight never finished the four-mile race, Harvard crossing the line over a half mile in front of the disheartened though plucky crew of old Eli.

Harvard took advantage of the splashing of the Yale crew at the start and jumped into a slight lead. With characteristic tenacity the Yale eight hung to Harvard's side down the lane formed by thousands of yelling spectators. When the half mile flag was passed Harvard's bow was about three feet in front of the blue oarsmen. At the mile flag the crimson octets had a regular racing pace and kept it up for 30 strokes, when Griswold sank lifelessly into the boat. His mates stopped rowing and waited for assistance from the shore.

Griswold labor revived. The insensible Griswold was lifted gently from the boat and carried to the clubhouse, where he was revived sufficiently to stand on his feet half an hour later.

Yale made no effort to finish, but the main body of the crew rowed cheerily as the strong-hearted youths in the blue continued on their way to the Yale quarters.

The largest crowd that ever attended a Yale-Harvard race was on hand and the stream was alive with all kinds of cheering and made glorious with college decorations.

SNOW IS DISAPPEARING FROM CRATER MOUNTAIN

Teams are already crossing the mountains near Superintendent Arant's station, which is down the mountain from Crater lake. Deep drifts are still found near the rim of the crater.

PLAN TO IRRIGATE 3,000 ACRES IN IDAHO

Salem, Idaho, June 26.—There is a scheme on foot to place water on more than 3,000 acres of rich land lying between the lower Payette ditch and the foothills directly east of Payette, the land being within a mile of the city.

The water is to be pumped from the ditch by means of electric power, which can be secured at a low rate as soon as the Oxbow power plant is completed on Snake river, which will be in a short time.

Those interested in getting the water from the ditch company desired to keep the matter secret, but it leaked out after a meeting of the directors of the ditch company last Saturday.

The land is above the frost line. The soil is rich. The tract will make one of the richest fruit sections of the Payette valley, which is already famous for its fine orchards.

Clear Lake Dam May Be Built

Klamath Falls, Or., June 26.—Director Newell of the reclamation service has telegraphed the landholders under the Klamath project at Bonanza, who recently held a meeting and sent him a telegram demanding that the Clear Lake dam be constructed this year, that work would begin as soon as the required 50 per cent of the land is signed up.

The landowners in that region now have 74 1/2 per cent signed.

State Land Sale in Idaho

Boise, Idaho, June 26.—There will be a state land sale at Shoshone, Lincoln county, on June 29. The tract to be offered for sale lies mostly under the Twin falls north side canal and is appraised at from \$12 to \$22.50 per acre, with water rights at \$15 per acre. No residence is required and the deferred payments cover a period of 16 years.

IDAHO WOOL GROWERS TO HOLD SALE JULY 1

Boise, Idaho, June 26.—A wool sale will be held at Blackfoot July 1, under the auspices of the Idaho Wool Growers' association. It is expected that a large amount of the product will be offered at that time.

SPUD PATCHES AND HAYSTACKS STOLEN

Fitchburg, Cal., June 26.—Hay by the stack and potatoes by the patch are the spoils of thieves near here, who seem to find nothing too large to steal. Farmers are arming themselves with shotguns and sleeping in their fields. There is talk of forming a vigilance committee to ferret out offenders and deal summary vengeance.

The last straw came yesterday morning, when H. Newth found a bare spot of ground where a 15-ton stack of hay had stood the night before.

A few days previous a neighbor had lost all of his potatoes from his patch in a single night, the job of digging being of such magnitude that half a dozen men must have had to work most of the night. In each case wagon tracks can be traced as far as the first much-traveled road. Officers are investigating.

Electric Current for Centralia

Centralia, Wash., June 26.—At a regular meeting of the city council of this city last evening, bids were opened for the supplying of this city with electrical current for a period of 10 years.

There were two bidders, the Centralia Electric & Power company, and O. D. Cunningham of Seattle.

The council also awarded a contract to the American-La France Fire Engine company for a combination hose and chemical wagon. Arrangements are being perfected for installing a paid fire department.
