

DIRECTOR AT IRRIGATION FOR OLD ORCHARD

Eight Giddy Girls of Cleveland Shock Guests at Hotel Just Awful.

Old Orchard, Me., June 27.—This very staid, sedate, ultra-aristocratic old summer resort has put it all over gay Paree in the matter of exhibiting the sheath gown and portions of the human anatomy that necessarily go with it. That is, eight giddy young women from Cleveland, Ohio, did the trick. Today was hot and humid, with a nervous feeling in the air. Every one was afraid to venture away from the hotels. There was nothing much else to do, so the Cleveland girls climbed into their sensational garments and marched nonchalantly into the dining-room of one of the big hotels. Women diners gasped; men choked and dropped silverware on the floor in open-mouthed astonishment. The dining room young women not only were attired in the regulation directorate affair, including the slit in one side of the skirt, but in addition had hose, or men's real socks. A man's garter was snapped to the top of the sock, and properly anchored otherwise.

WORDY BATTLE IN RUFF BAIL CASE

Judge Dunne Spurns a Ruff Surety and His Coin Along With Him.

San Francisco, June 27.—A wordy battle, which almost disrupted court proceedings several times, marked the hearing today of Abraham Ruff's petition for bail before Judge Dunne. The belligerent parties were Attorney Frank Murphy for Ruff, and Judge Dunne. The trouble came over the attempt made by Murphy to have Erskine Richardson qualify for bail for Ruff. Examination brought out the fact that Richardson owns no real estate, and Judge Dunne excused him. Murphy objected and said he desired to prove the witness was worth \$50,000. "I don't care if he has a million dollars in the bank," said Dunne, "he's excused." Several witnesses were examined. Ruff was allowed about one tenth of his bail and sent back to the county jail until Friday, when more bondsmen will be offered.

EUGENE'S MARKET DAY A SUCCESS

Double Public Marriage Is One of the Unique Features—Heavy Attendance.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Eugene, Or., June 27.—Eugene's first "Market Day" was held today, and was a great success. The affair had been widely advertised and several thousand visitors were in the city. The exercises began in the morning with a street band concert by the Eugene military band. At 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon a vehicle and automobile parade occurred, many farmers and townspeople participating. The parade was headed by the two young couples who were married in the next park immediately after the parade. The names of the brides and grooms were: Miss Ella M. Beaman, Lake county, and Albert J. Hendrick, Forest Grove; Miss Ella Love and F. C. Duin, both of Eugene.

OFFICERS REFUSE TO PUT LID ON WALLACE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Wallace, Ida., June 27.—An attempt was made this morning by Rev. Charles MacCaughy and Rev. J. D. Neelan to impeach Sheriff William Bailey of Shoshone county for refusal to take action on an affidavit charging that gambling has been conducted in three of the rooms of Wallace. Sheriff Bailey refused to take action on the ground that no names were mentioned in the affidavit and that it was impossible to proceed against proprietors of saloons unless an information charging them with gambling was filed. Prosecuting Attorney Hanson of Shoshone county also states that the affidavit in its present form was worthless, and especially so in view of the fact that the justice before whom it was made had refused to act thereon. Hanson also issued a statement to the effect that he would not believe the affidavit, a man named Strader, on his oath at any time. The ministers appeared before Judge W. W. Woods of the district this morning and, while the matter has been taken under consideration, it is unlikely that any action will be taken.

LABEL SUIT AGAINST DE YOUNG DISMISSED

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, June 27.—The label suit against M. H. DeYoung, proprietor of the Chronicle, which was brought by William J. Burns, special detective for the graft prosecution, was dismissed today by Police Judge Cabaniss. In granting the motion of DeYoung's attorneys for dismissal of the case, Judge Cabaniss said that although DeYoung was liable to prosecution, the fact that he was not a member of the committee of the publication of the alleged label was sufficient proof that he had no knowledge of it and consequently could not be held responsible in this particular case.

BIG BILL TAFT IS STRONG IN IDAHO

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Boise, Idaho, June 27.—Senator W. E. Borah has returned from Cincinnati where he went for a conference with the staff and Sherman as a member of the subcommittee of the Republican national committee. The senator expressed himself in favor of the nomination of a candidate for United States senator at the Republican state convention and stated there was nothing in the rumor that President Taft was a member of the committee to be removed. Borah says he is confident Taft will win and that he will fight for a clean Republican state ticket to be nominated.

Preliminary Surveys Being Made Out of Eugene—\$5,000 Available.

Salem, Or., June 27.—Not only is the necessity of irrigation in the Willamette valley realized but the first steps toward an irrigation project in the Willamette valley have been entered upon at Eugene by the state in conjunction with the government. In 1907 \$3,000 was appropriated for this work by the legislature and as it is the practice of the government to add a similar amount, \$5,000 is now available for the geological survey already begun on a sheet including 225 square miles in which is situated the city of Eugene. Notice was received from the federal government last week that the additional \$2,000 had been apportioned Oregon for geological surveys in the Willamette valley and the secretary of state at once gave the state engineer instructions to go ahead with the survey. Changes have been ordered and the work is now progressing near Eugene. It will probably take from three to four months to complete the survey, which the Albany sheet will be taken up and then the Salem and Oregon City sheets.

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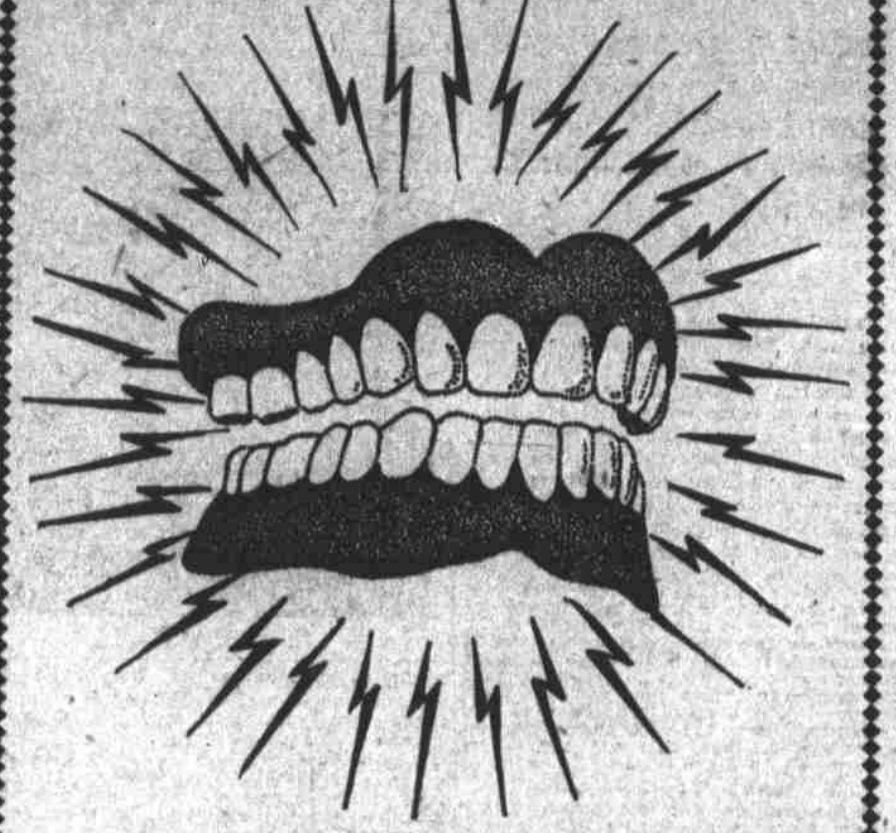
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
