## GOTCH AND ROLLER WRESTLE TONIGHT

World's Champion and Seattle Physician to Decide Next Title-Holder.

 Seattle, Wash., July 1.—Frank Gotch, the world's champion wrestler, and Dr. B. F. Roller of this city, one of the most promising mat artists that have come to the front in a long time, have completed their work of preparation for their match here tonight. The bout has attracted a vast amount of attention and it is expected an enormous crowd will be on hand to witness the contest.

The reason that Gotch is familiar to all followers of the sport. The career of Dr. Roller is comparatively unknown to the general public for the reason that until quite recently he has stuck to the amateur ranks. He was born in Illinois 22 years ago and is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania. He came to Seattle four years ago and since then has participated in many wrestling matches and has always come out a winner. His first victory against a professional was with Jack Carok, then champion heavyweight of England, Canada and Australia. He has also defeated Farmer Brown, Emil Klank, Fred Beel and several other well known mat artists.

Dr. Roller stands six feet without shoes and weighs 210 pounds. He is said to have earned \$18,000 by his wrestling matches during the last six months. Besides this he has a large practice as a physician and surgeon.

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## FAST MOTOR BOATS TO RACE ON FOURTH

Two Speediest Boats on the River Finally Brought Together for Cup.

If the motor-boat racing of the Willamette club two weeks ago was interesting it will not be a marker to what is in store for the enthusiasts on the afternoon of the Fourth. Several fast boats were on the river then, but the fastest of them all will be determined July 4.

A handsome cup has been put up which will bring together Johnny Wolf's flyer, The Wolf, and Louis Rosch's speeder, Arlen II. The Wolf was built at the Phoenix Iron Works in Portland, while the Arlen II is an imported boat.

Rosch, who is located with the Egan-Spaulling-Woodard people, will also enter the Alamo against the Happy Heine, winner of the last regatta, and other fast boats. The Swan, another fast launch, will probably be entered in the handicap race.

The Arlen II is capable of going 25 miles an hour and its trial spin showed it was a boat of quality. Those who have seen The Wolf split the water contend that it goes 30 miles an hour. When the supreme test comes there will undoubtedly be a race worth going miles to see.

Wolf's Arlen II also be entered in the race. It may be sent from the scratch or it may go in the handicap event. It was known to be the fastest boat on the river until The Wolf was placed in the water.

The races will be over the same course as before and the starting hour will be about the same.

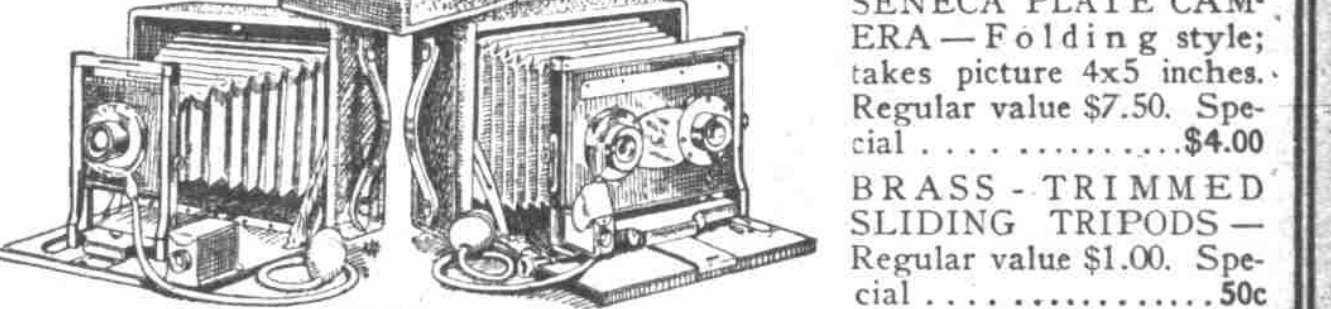
