

# LOCAL MONEY TO BUILD STATE'S TRAFFIC LINES

### Business Men Respond Liberally to Call for Subscription to Better Transportation Facilities — Columbia Must Be Opened and Rail Lines Finished.

Portland business men crowded the parlors of the Commercial club last evening to consider transportation questions affecting Portland. It is said to have been the best meeting of this character ever held in the state. As the result of a showing made by J. N. Teal, of the importance of this city's business men owning and operating lines of steamers on the upper Columbia and Snake rivers, more than \$12,000 was added to the sum already subscribed to a fund that will probably reach \$100,000. The earnestness and enthusiasm of the business men is evidenced by the fact that more than \$64,000 has already been raised. Committees will continue work and with the handsome sum already on hand it is believed the fund can be run up to the mark necessary to properly finance a large steamboat company to be formed by representative business men and operated in the interest of Portland commerce, as far inland as Lewiston on the Snake, and Priest Rapids on the Columbia.

## DIVIDEND DOLLARS MOVING DAY

### Ten Millions, Long Locked Up, Will Go Floating Around in Frisco.

San Francisco, July 1.—Ten million dollars was put into circulation today when semi-annual dividends were paid by commercial and savings banks and industrial institutions of San Francisco. The savings banks of the city have announced that they will pay dividends for the half year on a basis of four percent per annum and the average dividend of the other corporations will amount to about the same.

While the money to be paid out in dividends will not go in large amounts to any few individuals or groups of individuals, most of it will return to the savings banks and be available for loans on real estate.

## ALMOST A TRAGEDY OCCURS AT ROSEBURG

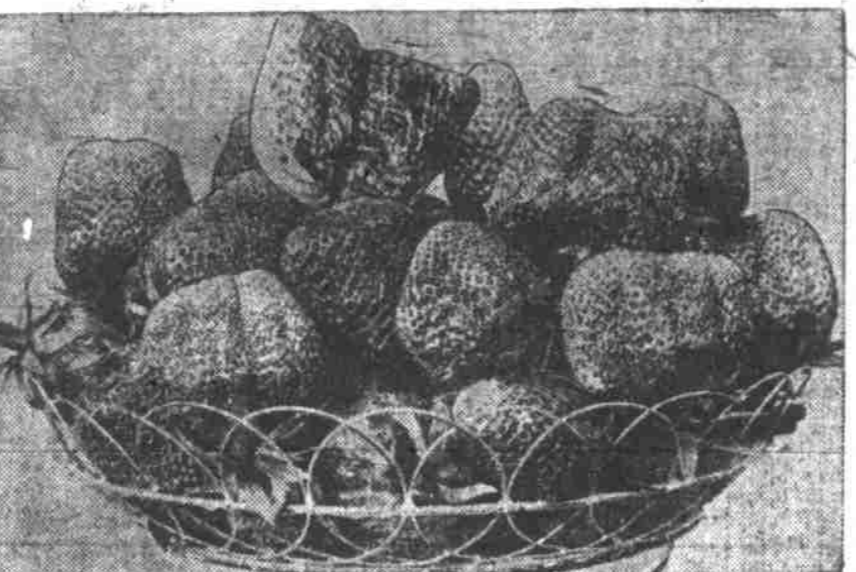
### Excavation Causes Collapse of Building—Workmen Saved by Its Occurring at Noon Hour.
