NEVADAN CALLS FOR SALMON SHIPMENT

Norwegian Steamer Tabor Arrives at Astoria and Goes to Knappton to Load Lumber for Australia—British Steamer Aeon Clears.

came along and picked up what freight was on hand at this port. One of them, the British steamer Aeon, which cleared last night for Napier, New Zealand, with 1,000,000 feet of fir lumber taken on here at the mills of the North Pacific Lumber company, and 89,899 feet of redwood lumber and 75,000 redwood shingles, taken on at Eureka, Cal. The fir goes to Napier, but the redwood goes to Sydney, N. S. W. The Aeon was given very quick dispatch, since she arrived here only a week ago. The large Norwegian steamer Tabor arrived at Astoria yesterday afternoon and went to Knappton to load lumber for Australia. She comes under charter to G. W. McNear & Co. and will receive her cargo at the Knappton mills opposite Astoria. The Norwegian steamer Guernsey which has been loading lumber at Tongue Point for several days will come to the mills of the Portland Lumber company some time this week to finish the cargo for Shanghai. The American-Hawaiian Steamship company's liner Nevada arrived at Astoria yesterday afternoon to take on shipment of salmon for transshipment over the Isthmus to New York. The Nevada came in from Seattle on her way to the Isthmus by way of San Francisco.

NEW C. R. R. ORIENTAL LINER. Princess Charlotte Will Come Out From England Shortly.

Victoria, B. C., July 1.—Another Canadian Pacific steamer has been launched in England. In a couple of months the Princess Charlotte will steam around the Horn and assist the Canadian Pacific company in its present struggle for command of Puget sound trade. The new vessel first touched the water last Saturday. She was christened by Mrs. Marpole, wife of the Canadian Pacific executive assistant. Having five decks the ship can accommodate many more than any other ship on the coast and will have greater speed. The Charlotte will establish a new passenger steamer standard on the Pacific. Canadian Pacific officials are confident that her appearance will compel the Inland Navigation company to give up its rate contest between Victoria, Vancouver and sound points.

THREE VESSELS SPOKEN. Windjammers Coming Here Seen Off the Morocco Coast.

The reported vessels are the French bark Leon Blum, the British ship Brablock and the British ship Carmanian. The Leon Blum was taken for new crop wheat loading about four weeks ago. She will stop at San Francisco to deliver some general freight brought out from Shields before coming here. The Blum was spoken in the vicinity of the Cape Verde islands on May 29, and should be well along towards Cape Horn by this time. The Brablock was spoken a few degrees farther north than the Blum, in the vicinity of the Canary islands off the Morocco coast. She is bringing cement and general cargo from Antwerp. She was spoken June 12.

ASTORIA MARINE NEWS. Lumber-Laden Sailing Schooners Are Ready to Depart.

Astoria, Or., July 1.—The schooner John A. Campbell cleared this morning for San Pedro with a cargo of 875,000 feet of lumber, loaded at the Tongue Point Lumber company's mill. A contract was made today whereby the steam schooner Olsen and Mahoney will tow one of the Benson log rafts to San Diego. The schooner W. F. Jewett cleared at the custom house today for Redondo, with 595,000 feet of lumber.

The steamer City of Panama left San Francisco last night for Coos Bay and is due to arrive here next Sunday in place of the steamer Breakwater. The steam schooner Nome City will leave Couch street dock Saturday night for Coos Bay instead of the steamer Alliance which will be off the Coos Bay run a couple of weeks for a general overhauling.
