

# REBELS WILL BE PUT TO SWORD

## With Fall of Tabriz Shah's Butchers Will Enact a Shameful Horror.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

St. Petersburg, July 1.—News of the first decisive battle of the revolution in Persia, reached this city early today. The city of Tabriz, in the north of Persia, where the rebels had concentrated their forces for the fight in the north, is in a state of siege and heavy fighting is going on. Over 300 have already been killed by the shah's troops and the city is expected to fall. It is feared that when the troops of the shah get into the city a general massacre will take place.

The fighting at Tabriz started last night. The soldiers of the constitutional party had concentrated in the city for their big battle against the shah's troops. For several weeks they have been collecting in Tabriz in preparation for the coming struggle. Reinforcements had been sent from the south and the disaffected provinces of northern Persia, and Russian soldiers are reported to be allied with the malcontents.

The shah's troops came up to the city last night and immediately set off communication. The city has been surrounded and field artillery being used to batter down the walls. The last report received before the shah's troops went down said that the shah had ordered a general advance and it was thought the city could not hold out much longer.

It is practically certain that when the Persian Cosacks once get into the city, men, women and children will be massacred, and the soldiers of the malcontents are making a desperate fight.

### VIENNA HAS DOUBTS.

Thinks Story of Rebellion in North Is Faked Up for the Czar.

Vienna, July 1.—The reports from St. Petersburg to the effect that there is a revolution in the north of Persia are regarded with suspicion here. It is thought the reports are purposely exaggerated in order to give the czar a pretext to make a military demonstration in the north of Persia. The situation is being watched with the keenest interest.

Vienna, July 1.—Diplomatic circles here are keenly interested in the recent developments in northern Persia and it is openly admitted that Austria regards with suspicion the advance of the Russian forces into Persian territory. The czar, Nicholas, is planning a grab of Persian territory and is using the malcontents of the shah's realm to further his own interests.

Dispatches received from the frontier state that the rebellion in northern Persia has taken on the aspect of a real war and that the casualty list runs into the thousands.

The czar's forces in Persia now constitute a respectable army, according to the best advice obtainable here, and every able-bodied man of fighting age in the shah's territory is in arms. The viceroy of the Caucasus is mustering fresh forces as rapidly as possible and is holding daily conferences with the Russian military authorities.

A dispatch received from the Teheran state that a mutiny has broken out in the Persian capital and that 12 members of the national council condemned by court-martial have been executed. There are indications that the sultan of Turkey will intervene to prevent Russia's gaining too strong a foothold in Persia and in this event, the affairs of the Caucasus may involve all the nations that impinge on the Balkan peninsula.

The situation in diplomatic circles is strained.

### DICKERING WITH RUSSIA.

Governor of Tabriz Further Incenses Foes of Despotism.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
Paris, July 1.—Dispatches received here today state that Tabriz, in northern Persia, is in a state of siege. The shah's troops are expected to capture the city at any moment. The revolutionists have been in possession of Tabriz since June 12, when they drove the governor out of the town, capturing all the government buildings and secured possession of 12,000 rifles.

The governor of Tabriz is in communication with the Russian forces on the frontier and the people of the city are incensed. They have called on all loyal citizens to renounce their allegiance to the shah, who has abolished constitutional government, and to kill the Russians.

# THE PLAY

By K. R. W.  
Robert Mantell as Macbeth at the Heilig last night was something to be remembered. From that sturdily impetuous, respectable, though not overcupulous soldier before temptation gets hold of him, to the wasted, tremulous, conscious seared villain, is a long and tragic way. As Mr. Mantell portrays it, however, it is a most absorbingly realistic way, and inevitable from the first half formed thought of wickedness. It was a great interpretation, and the tragic horror of it remains.

Miss Lillian Kingsbury proved a most able support. Her Lady Macbeth was a virtuous character, while not minimizing the unscrupulous, the overwhelming ambition that spurs her on to the accomplishment of the tragic and awful deeds, she succeeds in putting into the portrayal so much of tact and grace, so sincere a love for her husband, and so much of the womanliness that aspires for her husband's sake and not for her own that the character of Lady Macbeth takes on a new meaning and power. It would not have been so great a piece of work had she not the compelling personality that she has, and the deep full voice that carries out so ably the depths of her nature. Her Lady Macbeth was a remarkably able interpretation of one of the most complicated characters in fiction; something that transcends the personality of one woman and becomes a reading of humanity itself.

The cast was uniformly good. Mr. McGinn as Macduff proving particularly strong. The scene which brings him the news of the raid of his castle and the death of wife and children was splendidly done.

All the minor characters were ably carried, although they are so unimportant by contrast with the intense things that are working out in the characters of the two principals that they seem relatively of less power than in almost any other Shakespearean drama.

The settings were appropriate and not overdone, and were managed with a remarkable celerity, considering how numerous are the changes. The book omits the English characters and scenes, following the playing version of Edwin Booth.

# CHEER UP VANQUISHED Grog-Shop, Don't Cry

## You'll Be a Drug-Store, Bye and Bye—But Eleven Counties Dry.

Inhabitants of 12 counties in Oregon today are either trying to forget their last drink or are wondering where they will get their next one, for last night at 12 o'clock the saloons in that number of counties went out of existence by order of the people's votes and the proclamation of the law.

Bargain sales of booze have been the order of the day for some days in most of the counties, and as a result the private stock of a large number of the lovers of the fluid that cheers have been augmented by liquors cheaply purchased.

In Pendleton and Umatilla county and in most of the wet counties which have gone dry the last night was one of sorrow and at the same time of joy. The saloonmen sold drinks at bargain counter prices, gave them away and treated, while those of foresight and prospective thirst stocked up like the camel until they forgot their coming woe in the joy of the present.

The counties which have become dry as a result of the last election are: Crook, Douglas, Gilliam, Grant, Josephine, Klamath, Malheur, Morrow, Polk, Umatilla, Union and Wheeler.

Out of the 33 counties of the state saloons to operate and in these are many dry precincts: Baker, Clatsop, Clatsop, Columbia, Coos, Harney, Lake, Marion, Multnomah, Wasco and Washington.

Lincoln county alone of all those in which there was once local option has become wet by a margin of three votes and today the saloons of the county, particularly of Newport, are opening for business. Great interest is being manifested in the situation in Newport and the saloonmen and the city council are taking particular pains to see that the place is run in an orderly manner, as it is feared that the

least disorder in the places will result in the county going dry once more at the next election.
