Mrs. Stock finally told her husband she had ceased to love and would leave him some day. Then last Monday she left her babies and dropped from sight.

AMERICAN JAILED BY GUATEMALANS

Goes Ashore at San Jose and Has Not Been Heard From Since.

San Francisco, July 2.—That an American citizen is now either languishing in jail in Guatemala or has been executed in the Central American republic for complicity in the revolution there, is the story brought to this city by officers of the Pacific Mail line that has arrived here from the south. E. Barrington, said to be from New York, is the name of the man, whom the steamship people think has been killed.

Barrington landed at San Jose 10 days ago from the city of Sydney and was immediately arrested. He is said to have had incriminating papers in his pocket and it is thought that he was ordered shot.

Despite the fact that recent arrivals report that there is no let up in the outrages perpetrated by President Cabrera, Coahuila, A. Declairmont, a Californian who is on the South American executive's personal staff declared today that some time the people of the United States will discover that his chief is a pleasant, humane, plain gentleman. Referring to the attempt to assassinate Cabrera, Declairmont said the president appeared to bear a charmed life, his hat and frock coat being riddled with bullets.

The colonel denied the stories of wholesale executions following this attempt and said that only three colonels and six ministers of the cabinet were executed. He believes the president would have been justified in condemning to death at least 100 men who were implicated in the conspiracy.

PLAGUE RAT MAKES SEATTLE UNEASY

Seattle, Wash., July 2.—A rat bearing all the symptoms of being affected with bubonic plague germs is now in the possession of the health authorities. It was caught in the residence section of the city.

This is the first plague rat located in this city since April 30, last, and the fact that it is the first to come from the residence district has caused considerable uneasiness among the officials who have had charge of the campaign against the plague.

WATER POWER ON THE S. P. LINE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Eugene, Or., July 2.—A number of the Southern Pacific surveyors, who left Eugene two weeks ago to resume work for the Natron extension of the railroad across the Cascade mountains into eastern Oregon, are now at work surveying for a power canal on Salt creek, a tributary of the upper Willamette river.

S. W. Curtis, a representative of the Southern Pacific company has made filings on several water power sites in the Cascades east of Eugene, one being on Salt creek, where the surveyors are now at work. At this point

the canal will be six or eight miles long and in that distance the fall is about 1,500 feet. The volume of water is sufficient to generate about 20,000 horse power.

The general supposition has been, ever since Curtis began filings on these power sites, that the company would at some future time utilize the power of these streams to furnish electricity with which to operate its trains over the Cascades on the proposed railroad. The beginning of the surveys for the power canal seems to verify the supposition.

South Carolina Fire Fighters.
Darlington, S. C., July 2.—There is small chance for a fire to gain headway here, for the city is filled to overflowing with fire ladders from every section of the state. The occasion is the annual meeting and tournament of the South Carolina State Firemen's association. The prize tournament will take place today, and on Friday the gathering will wind up with a big parade.
