This is the question now being asked by all those who are interested in the case. Mrs. Giggey states positively that Nellie left a message on her dresser, which read: "I have jumped into the bay at last," but she cannot locate it now. Mrs. Giggey, who found the message, did not even show it to Charles A. Giggey, Nellie's father, who was in the house at the time, and why she acted as she did is the question that is now puzzling the police.

Giggey has employed a diver and as soon as a diving suit can be shipped from Seattle will attempt to locate the girl's body.

BREAKS LAW BUT ESCAPES PENALTY

Efforts to bring the University shingle mill under the state law which

prohibits the fouling of fish streams with sawdust proved unavailing yesterday when Judge Reid dismissed the charge against A. J. Kroenert because the prosecution could not prove that he was the proprietor of the mill.

This makes the third time the case was called. It having been indefinitely postponed when it was set for trial January 21. The University shingle mill is operated on the Willamette river near University Park. A defective burner permitted the sawdust to fall into the stream. This was not denied by the defense but technicalities saved the mill company from punishment. Officers against this law may be fined not less than \$50 nor more than

\$500 upon conviction. The question now is, who owes the University shingle mill?

Will Not Charge Storage.
