SOUTHPAW SUTOR BLANKS BEAVERS

Texan Lets Northerners Down With Dull Thud— Groom Chased Out.

San Francisco, July 3.—Unable to hit Southpaw Sutor effectively and helplessly before the daring baserunning of the Seals, Portland went down to her third successive defeat yesterday afternoon. A quintet of scattered bingles was all the Texan allowed the hard-hitting northerners. Manager McCredie chased Groom to the bench in the fourth after three safe swats had scored two men and Johnson finished up. Four hits and one run were made off Ote. The locals played flawless ball.

The Seals scored right off the reel. Mohler caught one of the first balls pitched by Groom, which he stretched into a double. He promptly fished third. The foxy kid was unusually fleet of foot yesterday and willing to take any chance. When Zelder hit to short and was thrown out at first the kid beat Danzig's throw to the plate. It was a bit of work that brought the crowd to its feet.

The locals made it two more on the Beavers in the fourth. Bobby Groom was touched up for three singles by Melchior, Curtis and Berry and this with three stolen bases and a base on balls allowed the home guard to ring the bell twice. The last run of the quartet was made in the seventh. Hildebrand found one of Johnson's giants, the Swede having replaced Groom, for a single. He moved on to second on Whalen's passed ball. Williams drew four wide ones and a double steal allowed the Seals to score.

Only once did Portland show an semblance of a battling rally. That was in the third inning, when two singles were copped from Groom. Danzig Basey was the only Beaver to get better than one hit, the little Italian coping two singles. The score:

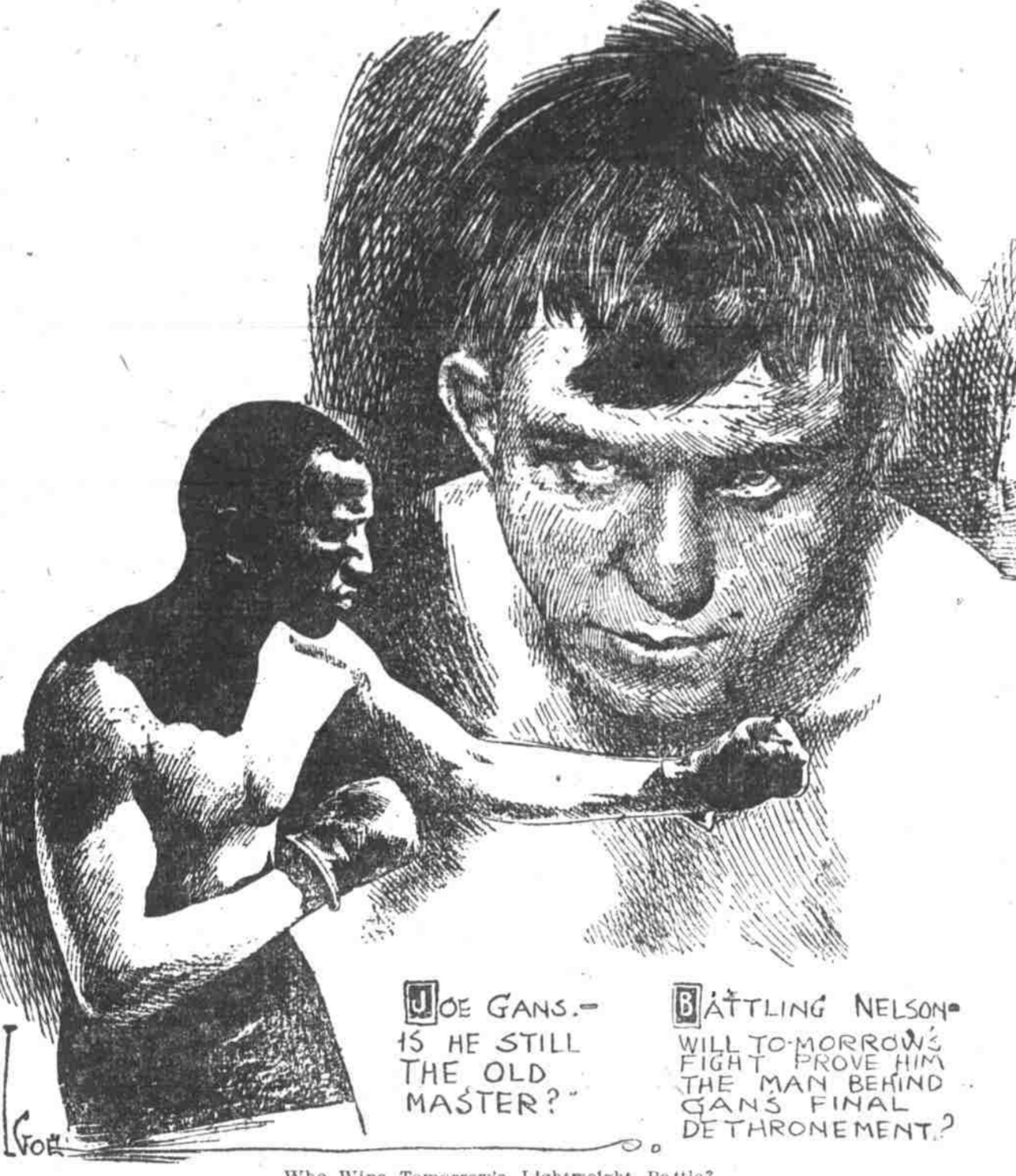

These two young men will be used in Saturday's game, and as such is determined to win the struggle will be equal to it for not surprising last Saturday's performance.

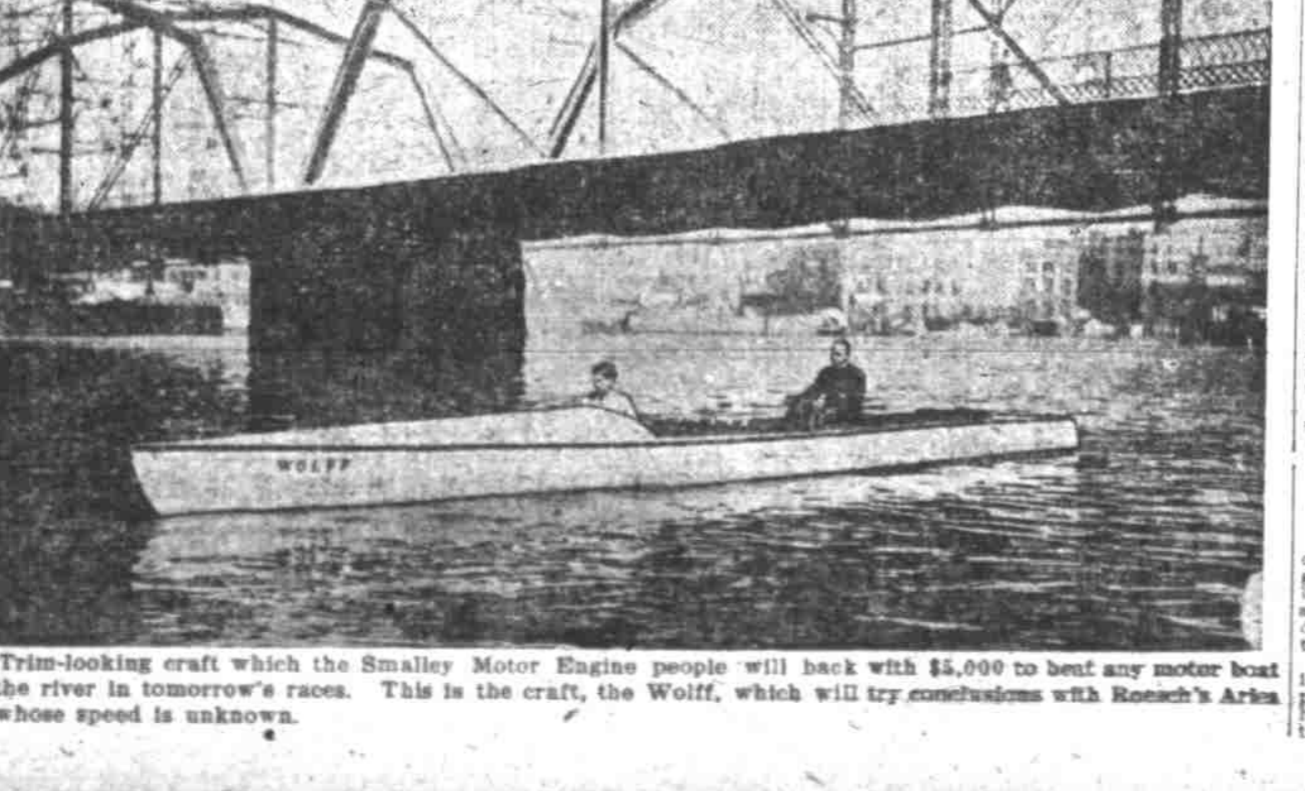

FRISCO BUZZING WITH FIGHT TALK

Critics Concede Nelson a Chance If Battle Goes Over Twenty Rounds.

San Francisco, July 3.—San Francisco is already beginning to buzz with the talk of fight fans in anticipation of the contest between Joe Gans and Battling Nelson. Tomorrow afternoon the two great lightweights are to meet again in the Mission arena in an attempt to settle the question of relative supremacy. The names of the two fighters are today on every lip and little else is heard.

The amount of interest manifested in the bout is something of a surprise, considering the fact that it is generally looked upon as a "fence" for the dusky champion and the further fact that Nelson, since his last meeting with Gans, has met with a decisive defeat and is supposed to have gone back in condition and ability.

The attention that the match has attracted in sporting circles can only be accounted for by the fact that the spectators are assured of getting their money's worth whenever Gans and Nelson meet in the ring. In their previous bouts they have never failed to put up fast and interesting fights and there is no reason to expect that their meeting tomorrow will be an exception.

Both fighters are in the best of condition for the contest. Gans' appearances and the confidence of their respective camps count for anything. Gans is not inclined to hold the Dane cheaply, though he is confident of his ability to put him away and expects to do the trick before the 20th round is reached. Nelson knows what he is getting against when he tackles the champion and has trained faithfully for the fight. He is confident that if he loses in the fight tomorrow he is practically sure of being relegated to the list of "has-beens."

In the opinion of the best critics Nelson will have a fair chance to win the bout if Gans does not acquire the victory in the first 10 or 15 rounds. Nelson's staying powers of the colored fighter are not what they were a year or two ago and he does not vaunt that he done in the first half of the bout. He later may wear him down and defeat him before the end of the 45-round encounter.

BETTING BRISK ON MILL.
Negro Champion 10 to 4 Favorite—Dane Confident.

San Francisco, July 3.—Thousands of inquiries at the company of Gans and Nelson regarding the condition of the two fighters who will meet at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon for the 45-round battle for the lightweight championship of the world, made it necessary for the managers to shut down on information except to those having some legitimate claim.

Betting is brisk today, showing the first laying of money for the fight. The odds opened today at 10 to 4 with Gans the favorite, and so much money is being laid that there is a probability of forcing the odds up another point.

Nelson said he wished the fight was today instead of tomorrow. He is in perfect condition. He thinks he will be just as good tomorrow. He shows confidence after his exhibition in his followers. They say that they are confident that he will last 20 rounds and that they will win if he lasts 20 he will win.

Gans relates his serene state of mind. He and his backers believe he will put the Dane out before the twentieth. He is resting today taking care not to do anything that will strain his muscles.

The seconds will be: For Gans—Willie Keefe, Jack O'Keefe and "Kid" Crawford; for Nelson—Jack O'Keefe, Ed Mo, "Red" Cornet and Jeff Perry. Ben Selig, Gans' manager, will be in his corner also.

The first-round preliminary between Sam Nelson and "Red" Cornet will start at 1:45. The championship contest is scheduled to start at 2:30. The fight will weigh in the dressing-rooms and be ready to start as soon as they enter the ring.

CRAWFORD WOULD TRY "STRANGLER" SMITH

J. R. Crawford who recently came to Portland from Iowa, wants to meet any 150 or 155 pound man in the business in a wrestling match, Strangler Smith preferred.

"I have heard a good deal of Strangler Smith," Crawford said this morning. "I am particularly anxious to meet him at any time. Any one else in the 150 or 155-pound class will also be taken care of."

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MOTOR RACERS READY FOR GUN

Fleetest Boats on River in Speed Tests for Cup Tomorrow.

The first race of the Willamette Motor Boat club's tourney tomorrow will be called promptly at 2 o'clock, the first boat being sent away from the starting line in the under 10-mile class at that hour.

The four-mile handicap race with its turn around the steel bridge pier will occupy less than half an hour, so that the second race can be started at 2:30 o'clock sharp. The second race is a handicap for boats over 10 miles an hour.

The fourth special scratch race will be sent away at 3:15 o'clock and is for boats above 20 miles an hour. The distance is 8 1/2 miles.

There are two entries in the free-for-all scratch, which will start at 4 o'clock. The Wolf will try conclusions with the Arles II and the flyers will take two rounds of the 8 1/2 mile course, which extends from the club-house to the government light buoy at Swan Island. There are four turns in the race and the winner probably will be out down for this reason. Handsome silver cups are the prizes.

The races can be seen from the bluff at the foot of Ellsworth street or from the Morrison or Madison street bridges. Umpire H. H. H. has been appointed fleet captain for the races.

EBERLE KUYKENDALL GOES TO OLYMPICS

San Francisco, July 3.—The Olympic club track will be strengthened by the addition of Eberle Kuykendall, the University of Oregon athlete who is to attend Cooper Medical College upon the opening of the fall term in August.
