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Pastor Who Has "Made Good"

Rev. A. A. Winter, pastor of the First United Evangelical church, was born in Lycoming county, Pennsylvania, near Williamsport, October 4, 1871. In childhood he attended the district school in the winter months, but as his parents lived on a farm and a mile from school, he attended a one-term school when he was small and because of weather needed to help with the work when 20 days of schooling in a year.

At the age of 19 he entered the Muncy Normal school, graduating the second year, one of the three highest in the class, after which he taught for four terms in the public schools of the county.

In the summer of 1893 he took a business course in the Williamsport Commercial college. One year was spent in Dickinson, Pennsylvania, at the institution, which prepared him to enter the sophomore class in Central Pennsylvania college where he graduated with first honors in 1899 and received his degree of A. M. and three years later his master's degree.

He was converted in 1889 and united with the Mt. Zion class of the United Evangelical church and was granted a license to preach in 1891. He attended a vana conference at Williamsport in 1896. While at college he was strongly impressed with a desire to do a marked work in one of the mission conferences of the church.

He was called to the pastorate of the church which he built this conference year. Mr. Winter has taken a deep interest in public education and has been closely connected with it since coming to the coast as a member of the board of trustees of the University of Oregon.

SET SECOND BOOTH TRIAL FOR JULY 16

Conspiracy Case Next on Calendar of Federal Court. Robert A. Booth, his brother James Henry Booth and T. E. Singleton will face the United States court July 16 on a charge of conspiracy to defraud the government out of public lands.

The indictment under which the defendants are to be tried was returned by the grand jury April 15, 1908, and charges that the defendants conspired to illegally procure government lands by the use of false and fraudulent affidavits and to sell the same to the public.

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
