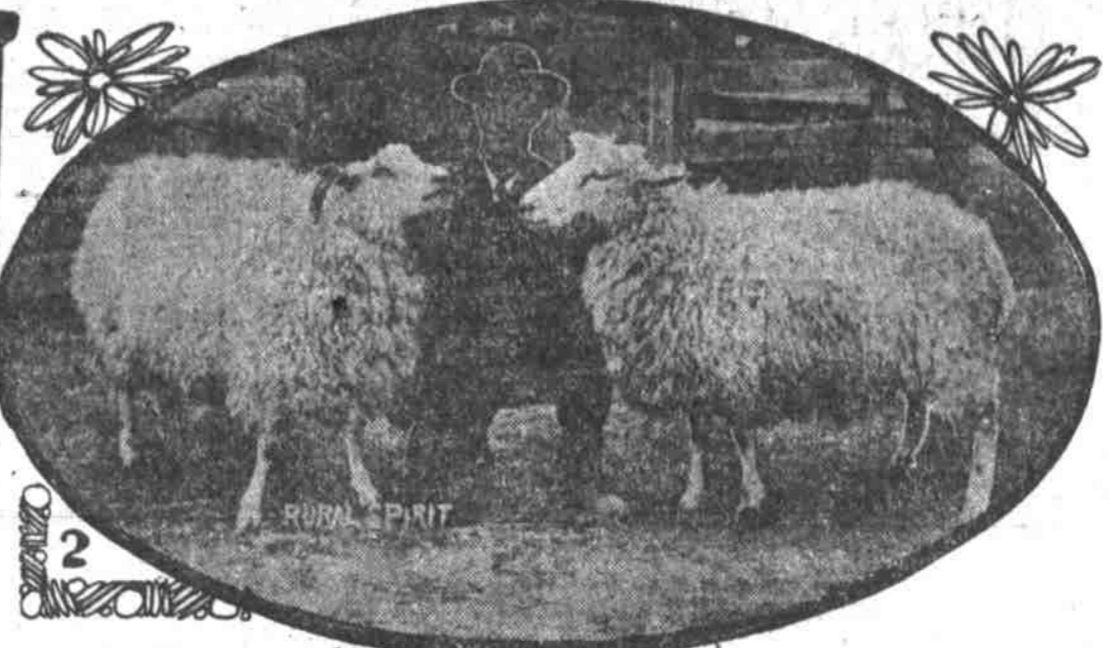


SCORES OF FAIRS WILL CONTRIBUTE TO PORTLAND'S GREAT LIVESTOCK SHOW



More than 60 fairs, race meets and livestock exhibitions throughout the United States and Canada have been requested to list entries in the first annual Pacific National Livestock show which is to be held in this city the third week of September. Of this large number which includes practically every state in the Union and every province in the Dominion in which fancy stock is bred and grown, more than half have responded, giving assurance that 12 enough dates on Western and Pacific Coast circuits can be secured entries for one or more divisions and classes will be sent out here.

Arrangements to put Portland in close touch with all parts of the country where horses, cattle, sheep and swine are developed for show-ring purposes are being made with all speed by the local people, and it is expected that within the course of the coming week the committee on prizes, premiums and trophies covering all divisions, sections, classes and specials, with champions, grand champions and sweepstakes will be selected, and without exception they are eastern men with extended experience in the most famous stock exhibitions ever held in America, and some of them will come here with international reputations.

Great Sum in Premiums.

While the premium lists are still far from complete, it is apparent that the awards will be close to the \$20,000 mark, far in excess of prizes ever awarded in any livestock exposition on the Pacific slope, and placing Portland immediately in the fore-front among livestock centers of the United States.

The final details regarding the amount of cash and the number of trophies to be given in the different sections will be taken care of at the meeting of the executive committee of the Country Club and Livestock association, at 4 o'clock, tomorrow afternoon. At this same time the question of whether it is advisable to include poultry show, industrial exhibits, or grant concessions will also be settled.

Never before has there been conducted such a wide-spread campaign to arouse interest in a similar exposition as there has been by the Pacific National management to enlist the support of livestock people of the country in this show.

MUCH MONEY IN CAMPAIGN FUNDS

Looks Like Sack Would Be Opened in Coming Presidential Fight.

Washington, D. C., July 4.—Evidence of plans to expend immense sums of money in the campaign this year crop out from time to time. Observers here note that method is being employed and that members of the congress who have been active, as well as effective, in bringing trust causes to light are singled out for especially hard struggles, and that opponents of such trust enemy candidates are financing their campaigns with ease.

Prominent democrats in Washington claim they have advised that Congressman Henry T. Rainey of Illinois, Democratic member, engaged in such a contest. Mr. Rainey was the man who exposed the watch trust, and who also, by deep study and forceful oratory, became one of the men in the house whom the Standard Oil trust marked for political slaughter.

Three years ago next fall certain retail watch dealers in New York began to advertise American-made watches which had been shipped abroad, bought there and reshipped back to their country; and which the dealers could sell much cheaper here than they could watches they bought directly from the factories in this country.

Develops Sensation.

Mr. Rainey went into the matter with care and industry, and developed startling facts—that the watch trust had so manipulated prices under the high tariff that they sold here so much higher than they did abroad that dealers here could afford to go abroad, buy the watches and send them back and then sell at prices from 20 to 30 per cent lower than was asked for watches bought direct here.

Mr. Rainey collected a mass of evidence showing the existence of a watch trust, and damaging to the high tariff as applied to watches. He supplied the government with the facts, and time and time again urged proceedings. The proceedings never have been begun.

His speech on this subject stirred the country as few have addresses delivered in recent years, and if already his reputation for force and fearlessness has not been made, it alone would have established him as one of the men of the hour, vigilant to guard the public weal and brave enough to antagonize the powerful elements which compose the industrial aggregations of the country.

Not less brilliant nor less instructive was his tourney against the Standard Oil, when he exposed that corporation in a house address which was subject of as much comment around the congress halls as any deliverance by anyone during the five years he has served in that body.

loudly declaim against the trusts, but in most instances they utilize grand, glittering generalities, and appear to exercise care lest they descend to the vulgar occupation of specifying some particular trust evil and offer some remedy therefor.

Was Never Yielded.

Congressman Rainey has never yielded in his insistence that trusts should be prosecuted under existing statutes, and he has gathered enough material, relevant matter, to convict half a dozen illegal combinations in restraint of trade, prepared to have at hand for the government attorneys, for Mr. Rainey himself is a lawyer of note in his state.

Such men as Rainey appear to have been selected for the most determined efforts to defeat them, and money is said to await the call of those candidates who will enter the lists against members of the congress who have made records for anti-trust activity.

ENGINEMEN KILLED IN EASTERN WRECK

Syracuse, N. Y., July 4.—Four persons were killed and 15 hurt in a wreck today on the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburg railroad near Broomfield, when a passenger train running about 60 miles an hour collided with a freight head on.

OREGON SOLDIERS TO MOBOLIZE AUGUST 3

Adjutant General Finzer Inspects Camp Site at American Lake.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Tacoma, July 4.—Adjutant-General Finzer of Oregon yesterday went over the army maneuver grounds at American lake with Brigadier-General Brush, commanding the department of the Columbia, who will be in charge during the forthcoming encampment of regulars and guardsmen, and was shown the camp sites of the Third and Fourth regiments of the Oregon National Guard. The two regiments and the Second Washington regiment will be encamped close together just east of the Northern Pacific railroad track at Murray station, about 17 miles from Tacoma.

General Finzer also accompanied Brigadier-General Brush, Major Burnham, his chief of staff, Adjutant-General Hamilton of Washington, Lieutenant Fulton, aide to General Brush, Major Baxter, quartermaster, from the Vancouver barracks; Captain McAndrews, acting quartermaster here, and Stuart Rice of Tacoma, in an inspection tour over the entire maneuver grounds yesterday, the party taking luncheon at the Country club and after touring the grounds again for several hours taking the afternoon train for Portland.

While here, Brigadier-General Brush went over the plans, as drawn up by Captain McAndrews and a corps of engineers for the encampment, and approved of them. General Finzer stated before leaving that the Third and Fourth of Oregon would mobilize at Portland, August 3. There will be about 1,400 men in both regiments.

The following organizations will take part in the encampment: First Infantry, Vancouver barracks; entire Third Infantry, from Forts Lawton and Wright; entire Sixth Infantry, from Harrison and Missoula, Mont.; First battalion of the Second Infantry, from Astoria; headquarters and four troops from the Fourteenth cavalry, Walla Walla and Boise; two batteries of mountain artillery, Vancouver; Company B, First battalion engineers, of Vancouver barracks; detachments from the signal and hospital corps from the Presidio, California; Second regiment, National Guard of Washington; Third and Fourth regiments, Oregon; First regiment, National Guard of Montana; First regiment, National Guard of Idaho.
