

EARL KERRY'S TEETH

Speech of Future Peer Is Threatened Because of a Strange Accident—Will He Make Himself Understood?

London, July 4.—Lord Lansdowne's eldest son, the Earl of Kerry, who has been returned lately to the house of commons from West Derbyshire, is fortunate in having been unopposed at the election. Had it not been so he probably would have been seriously handicapped by a nasty fall in the hunting field, which occurred a few days before the polling. He landed on his face and successfully removed most of his front teeth by the swiftest form of dentistry known. While this might seem a serious hindrance to a potential parliamentarian, it is one that is easily remedied with a little time, thanks to the invention of American dental methods.

First Appearance. This is the first appearance in politics of the future Lord Lansdowne and is watched with a great deal of interest by all who know the immense influence on English politics the house to which he belongs wields. He is no prouder nobleman in the whole of the British empire than Lord Kerry's father, the present Earl of Lansdowne. He is leader of the Unionist party in the house of lords and head and front of the fight for political reform which the majority of the house are making against the more radical members of the Liberal party. As the owner of Lansdowne House, in Berkeley Square, one of the grandest residences in London, and possessed of almost unlimited wealth derived from 1,000 acres of land, he is naturally challenged by but few of the holders of great names in England.

Brother-in-Law. Besides all these honors, which inevitably become his by succession, Lord Kerry has the distinction of being the brother-in-law of the new Duke of Devonshire, the head of another of the really great houses of Great Britain. Indeed, it was the duke whom Lord Kerry succeeded as representative of West Derbyshire, the former vacating the post upon entering the hereditary chamber.

The Earl of Kerry is 36 years old. To be sure, that is not an unusually youthful age for a peer. Some, such as the present Lord Winter, reach the benches of the lower house at 21. But then, in the average man's mind, the son of his peer is associated with wild dissipation, over-dressed actresses, "popping" wine and the like. A good many of the distinguished men with Lord Kerry's "expectations" would be sitting in the Gaiety stalls or doing almost anything except coming to the house of commons. Instead, Lord Kerry married a most charming Scotch girl, who, when she was just out of the school-room, has settled down to his Irish estate and now has taken the first step toward following in the footsteps of his illustrious father.

Like most of the sons of eminent English families, Lord Kerry journeyed out to South Africa and took part in the Boer war, but, unlike the majority, he came away with a reputation for ability. He has been in the King's Service Order and was also mentioned in dispatches from the front. He was for some time in the Grenadiers, one of the crack "regiments" of the British army, but is now a captain of the Irish Guards.

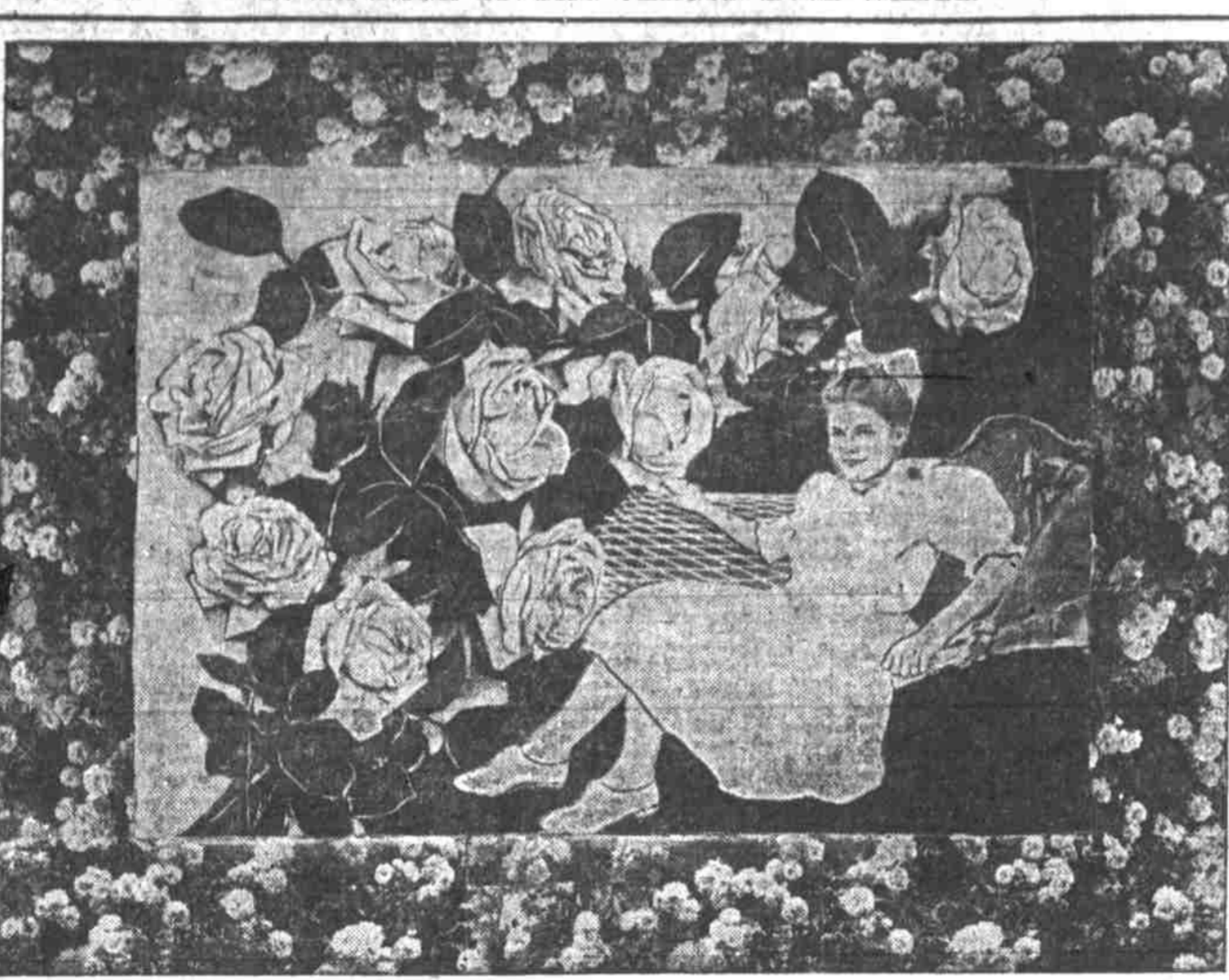
Since his marriage Lord Kerry has been assiduously cultivating the affections of his Irish tenantry. As a matter of fact, he was always very popular with the countryside people who lived near his father's estate. During the South African war prayers were publicly offered for his safety in both the United States and Roman Catholic churches of the neighborhood. Both Lord and Lady Kerry now live almost the year round in their Irish home, known as "Derreen," situated in the "Kildare" from which the former takes his courtesy title as the eldest son and heir to the marquis.

The New Member. The new member has been a mighty hunter of big game in South Africa and other haunts of wild animals. At his Irish home he is a big and powerful of the hounds. Personally he is a rather good-looking chap, with a moustache that by its size and texture is calculated to break the heart of any girl, respectable maid. He is generally to be seen in a lounge suit of Irish tweed and in dress. In the latter respect he is a striking contrast to his father, who is one of the best dressed men in the house of lords.

The name of Kerry recalls many interesting incidents connected with Irish life. It was Thomas, Lord Kerry, who in 1773 a fine and aged and decorated "hard" pasteurized through. It is rather a brilliant success for the proprietors. Contemporary evidence indisputably shows that from 1770 to 1800 the Lowestoft works were at the zenith of their fame. Owing, however, to the enormous expenses and difficulty incurred in procuring china clay from Cornwall and elsewhere (before the original clay was exhausted), and the rapidly increasing competition of other makers, its prosperity waned, the collapse came and the works were closed in 1805.
