

PUCE HUNT FOR ELOPERS

Father of Victoria Buyserie Enlists Chief in Effort to Locate Daughter—Left St. Paul With Freeman Vandell Friday.

Victoria Buyserie, aged 16, daughter of a pioneer family of French prairie, Marion county, is believed by her parents to have eloped with Freeman Vandell, son of a neighbor of A. J. Buyserie, the girl's father.

The Portland police were asked yesterday afternoon to apprehend the young pair. The girl is only 15 years old, while Vandell's age is given as 23 years by Mr. Buyserie, who left his home in St. Paul to seek his daughter in the city yesterday.

Without telling her parents that she intended to elope, Miss Buyserie left St. Paul in company with Vandell last evening. Later in the night the parents became convinced that the girl had left her home to marry Vandell, and the father started in pursuit without delay.

Unable to find any trace of the errant lovers in Portland through his own efforts, he appealed to Chief Fitzmaurice yesterday afternoon to put his detectives upon the trail. Mr. Buyserie believes that after spending the Fourth in Portland, Vandell and the girl will go to Vancouver today and tomorrow obtain a license from the Clarke county authorities and wed without delay. Returning from Portland's Gretna Green they will surprise their friends and parents.

All during last evening the officers assigned to special duty at the Oaks searched the crowd for the eloping pair but without success. The Vancouver cars were also watched, but in vain. Both families are well known in the vicinity of St. Paul, the Buyseries having lived there for years. Vandell has a strain of French Canadian blood in his veins.

The fact that Miss Buyserie took two dresses from her home, a red gown and a white one, and the fact that she married exceedingly difficult. She is aged 18, is about 5 feet in height, of light complexion, light brown hair and stooped shoulders. Freeman Vandell is aged 23 years, is dark and heavy looking, about 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighs about 165 pounds. He wore a dark checked suit.

SALEM CHERRY FAIR IS POSTPONED A WEEK

Fair Executive Committee Decided on Action Yesterday.

Salem, Or., July 4.—Owing to an unusually late season the Salem cherry festival now set for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 16, 17 and 18, instead of July 9, 10 and 11, has been postponed. C. A. Park, fruit commissioner for this district, made a tour of the valley yesterday and on his advice the executive committee of the association met today and decided to postpone the fair. The fair has been widely advertised throughout the state, but it is not thought the postponement will work any harm. The postponement will not cause surprise to many valley growers who are preparing to exhibit.

NEWS NOTES FROM CHILEAN REPUBLIC

(United Press Licensed Wire.) Santiago, Chile, July 4.—The Belgian government has made a proclamation against that of Chile, because it does nothing to protect the world of travelers and navigators against the bubonic pest, which prevails in all the northern ports of Chile, and declares our government a perpetual pest because it has no sanitary authorities or system of public hygiene like the nations which care for the lives of their people. The high price of paper has had the result of putting up the price of our newspapers, those which formerly sold for 5c being now held for 10c in this city and Valparaiso. All this time, say the papers, the country is burning up its wood, which might be burned up in paper pulp, as is done in other countries, thereby saving on this coast abundant material for fuel in its abundant petroleum. The government has perfected and proclaimed the law for constructing habitations for working people, 35,000 in bonds are to be placed on the market for the construction of a system, which will provide working people with dwellings at low rates of rent. During the last fiscal year the customs duties have yielded the public treasury \$119,878,312, being an increase in our income from that source of \$1,601,294. The commission appointed by the government to study the works for reconstruction of the port of Valparaiso have finished their work and report an expenditure of \$1,000,000. The government guarantees 5 per cent interest on the bonds secured by hypothecation of the mortgages held by the Argentine capitalists, who have considered the work, declare satisfactory.

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COUNTESS A SUICIDE. Wretched Story of Bohemian Nobleman and Daughter in Vienna.

New York Sun. The body of a young countess found floating in the Danube canal in Vienna has opened the eyes of the world to the social depths to which the Viennese sometimes sink. The story of the Countess Vieth has attracted more attention than anything else that has happened in Vienna in years.

To be only 19, beautiful, and to have the title of countess and then to commit suicide by throwing oneself in the water certainly argued all who heard of it. This young woman must have had very good reason for getting out of the world. To those who knew her it was no secret that she had reasons to escape from the life into which her father, a member of a Bohemian noble family, had introduced her.

Count Vieth and his family moved years ago to Vienna from Prague, where his family had been for nearly two centuries a high social family. The family was poor and the last thing in the world to secure to his head was to work. Long before the police discovered the source of the count's income he and his pretty daughter became known to the street set in Vienna. The two appeared one evening at Reuecher's and took their place in a box. She was

barely 15, strikingly beautiful and as innocent of the world as a child. From that time she was a regular evening attendant at the better class of restaurants and music halls. He was always with her. From a diary she kept the police were able to learn the story of her sufferings during the next four years. The two volumes were seized by the police record the depths to which human depravity can descend. They tell the success of the father's scheme to profit by his daughter's dishonor. Although it was known in Vienna that the two were following such a way of life, the police took four years to find it out. The father promptly challenged any man who spoke a word against his daughter, and in the case of women—such as a cashier at Romaner's who deplored the girl's fate—he threatened them with damage suits. The girl was called to court and compelled to testify against her father. On her arrival home she burst into tears and sobbed for hours.
