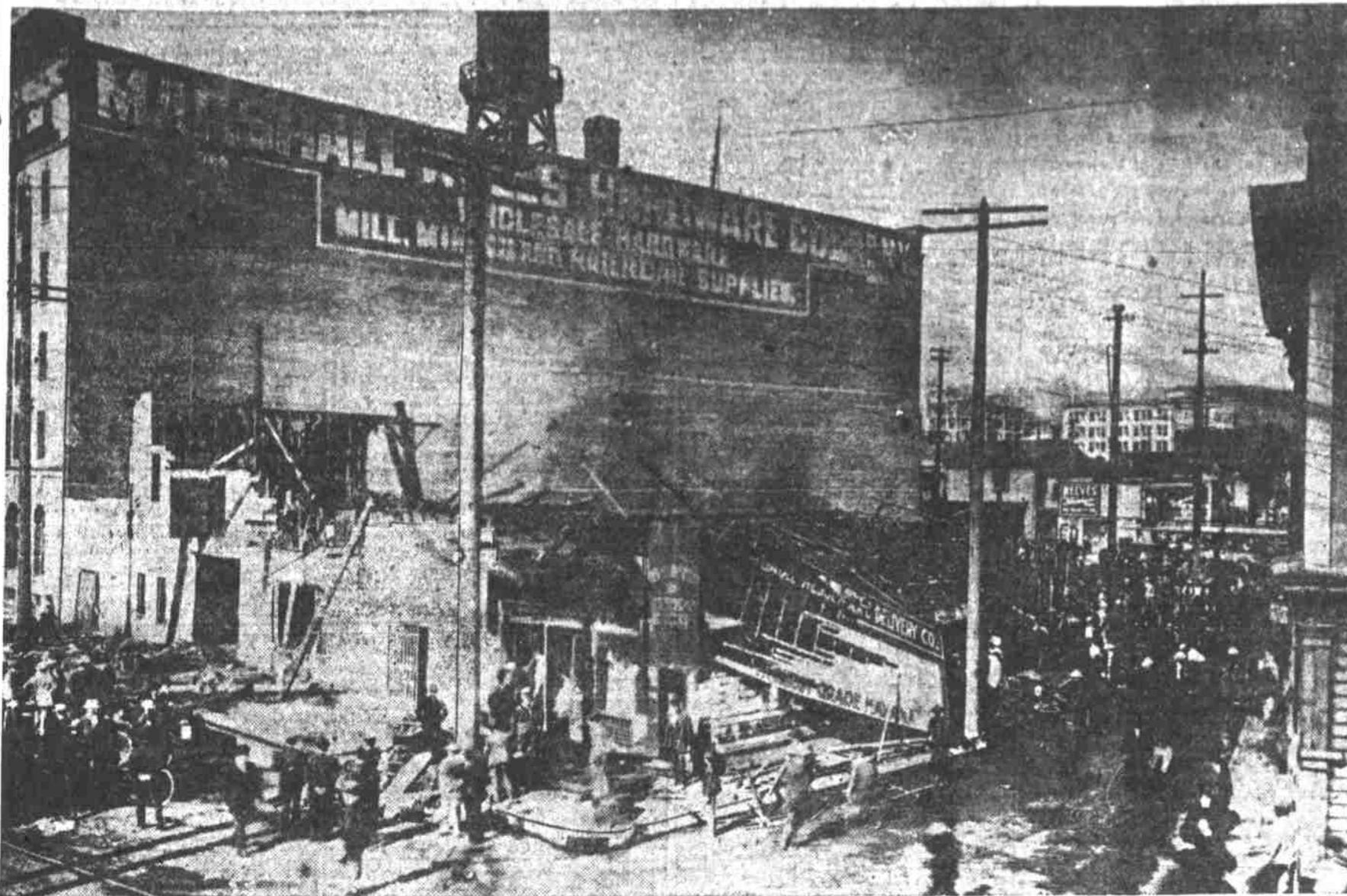


61 HORSES BURN IN \$15,000 STABLE FIRE SHOULD PASS LAW TO STOP HAWKERS



Ruins of Dexter Livery Stables, Fourth and Ankeny Streets, Destroyed by Fire Early This Morning. Beneath the Debris Lie the Charred Remains of 61 Horses.

Fire of unknown origin totally destroyed the Dexter livery stable on Ankeny between Fourth and Fifth streets at an early hour this morning, 61 horses being burned to death while a large number of buggies, quantities of harness and other property was a total loss. P. Hart & Co., proprietors of the stable, estimate their loss at between \$10,000 and \$12,000, while the insurance carried amounted to only \$600 and was carried on the feed stock alone.

Fire Spreads Rapidly.

A desperate effort was made by Patterson to save the 100 head of horses which were in the burning building. The mass of fodder and the tinder-like structure of the building however, fed the flames at such a rapid rate that 61 of the horses were burned to death in their stalls.

Arrangements Made to Cart the Bodies.

Arrangements were made by Patterson to cart the bodies of the horses to the crematory, where they will be incinerated as rapidly as the city plant can handle them.

The Dexter stables were operated by Hart & Co., which purchased them from the property of the late J. W. Hart, who died in 1907. The loss will fall heavily upon the firm, owing to the fact that there is absolutely no insurance covering anything except the feed.

Clear Away Debris.

It is stated by Mr. Beck that the property will be cleared off at once and put in good shape for future investment.

Several investors have been negotiating for the purchase of the property either in whole or in part for some time and it is probable that the deal will be closed within a short time. One person desires to purchase the entire half block while others are after portions of the lot.

The property is assessed at \$94,500 and its estimated market value is about \$150,000.

The fire damaged the water tank on the top of the Marshall Wells building, beyond a portion of the large sign on the Fifth street side and scorched the roof. It is estimated by the manager for Marshall Wells that the damage will be between \$300 and \$400, which is covered by insurance.

The solid wall construction of the Marshall Wells building, which is said to be the best constructed warehouse building on the Pacific coast, saved that structure from any damage either by fire or water.

The old shacks on the north of the stable across Ankeny street were damaged by fire and the contents entirely ruined. The Burton rooming-house was damaged to the greatest extent, it being estimated that the loss will amount to close to \$1,000.

Other Buildings Damaged. A number of popcorn and candy wagons belonging to peddlers and stored in a vacant lot back of the rooming house were also burned, while a small store room on the corner of Fifth and Ankeny was burned. The office of the Henninger Messenger company was destroyed, as was that of the Holman Sign Painting company. The Volunteers of America headquarters was destroyed and the contents ruined. The loss in some of these instances will exceed \$200.

The property containing the lodging house and other shacks belonged to the Pacific Paper company, which has been planning to tear down the old wooden buildings preparatory to constructing a modern building on the site. The tenants had been notified to vacate. The work of tearing down these old structures will be materially aided by their partial destruction by the fire.

The only person injured at the fire, so far as reported, was C. M. Patterson of the livery stable firm, who cut his left hand and wrist severely while trying to save the papers and books of the company from the safe in the office on the Fourth street side.

William Gladby lost six head of horses in the fire, together with five wagons, three buggies and equipment. The loss is estimated at \$2,500, which is partly covered by insurance.

The Perkins hotel lost its bus and a team of horses. The loss is estimated at \$2,000, covered by insurance of \$1,500.

J. W. Bailey, state dairy and food commissioner, lost a team of blooded driving horses valued at \$700. A third horse in the barn was rescued.

Two Men Painfully Injured in East Side Runaway Accident. Frightened by one of those pestiferous dogs which try to nip the heels of horses on every occasion, a horse driven by J. R. Kelley began to run at East Eighth and East Market streets last evening. At East Tenth the wagon struck a woodpile and the horse redoubled his speed.

The wagonload was composed only of loose boards, and these began to jolt out. Kelley and Wayman Castle, who was with him in the wagon, struck to it until they were pitched off by the flying boards at East Twelfth street. Both young men were carried to the residence of Dr. D. A. McIntyre, 314 East Eleventh.

Kelley was the worst injured, it being feared that he is hurt internally. Both Kelley and Castle live in Kenilworth, and were taken to their homes. The horse finally came to a standstill without being injured.

Mayor Vetoes Ordinance Providing for High License Fee.

Mayor Lane has vetoed the street hawkers' license ordinance on the ground that it is prohibitive and that the council thinks that the hawkers of fruits and flowers should not be allowed on the streets they should pass a bill to that effect, stating their objections. The veto message is as follows: To the honorable city council—Gentlemen—I return herewith ordinance No. 18,015, not approved.

This is an ordinance which amends sections 18 and 19 of ordinance No. 14,083, entitled an ordinance licensing, taxing and regulating certain businesses, calling and employments in the city of Portland and regulating the manner of issuing licenses.

An ordinance is drawn it seems to me to be ambiguous in some of its terms, and may even be construed to permit of the sale of such articles under conditions evidently intended to forbid the sale of the same.

The intent of this ordinance seems to be to prevent peddlers of fruit and flowers from selling their wares upon the public streets of the city and arrives at that result by making the cost of the license fee so high and conditions so onerous that they cannot be met.

If it is deemed wise and proper to forbid persons from engaging in this business, and many good reasons can be urged against it, an ordinance should be passed forbidding the pursuit of it at all.

For these reasons I return the ordinance to you for your further consideration. Respectfully, HARRY LANE, Mayor.
