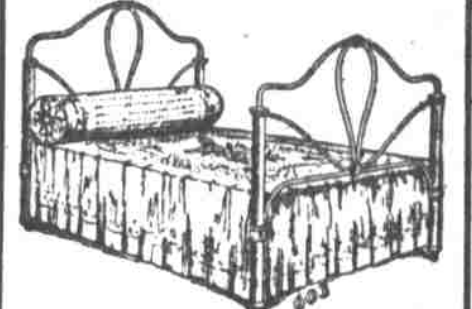

## GARFIELD DISCUSSES PROTECTION BY STATE

Plans for the conservation of the natural resources of Oregon are under consideration this afternoon by Secretary of the Interior James R. Garfield, F. H. Newell, head of the reclamation service

J. N. Teal, chairman of commission of the United States, and the Oregon commission appointed by Governor Chamberlain to outline some means by which effective action could be taken to that end.

In accordance with this plan and in order that the state commission may have the advice and counsel of the head of the interior department and of the man in charge of the government's reclamation work, the meeting was arranged for this afternoon in the office of J. N. Teal when the state organization may meet with the government officials and take counsel with them.

It is expected that much good will come of the meeting this afternoon, as the state commission, after its conference with Secretary Garfield and Mr. Newell, will be able to proceed on lines in accordance with the approval and desires of the heads of the forest and reclamation departments of the national government. ## BRYAN'S TOWN. READY TO RATIFY

Will Turn Loose, Irrespective of Party, Soon as Result Is Flashed.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Lincoln, Neb., July 9.—Lincoln is preparing to hold a big demonstration as soon as the nomination of William J. Bryan for president is announced. Irrespective of party, the citizens of the city will go in a body to Fairview to congratulate the candidate.

The band will march through the principal streets and the crowd will hurry to Fairview in streetcars, automobiles and on foot. President Shepard of the Bryan club will make the notification and congratulatory speech.

The city had considerable excitement last night when a crowd tore down a Taft and Sherman banner that had been stretched across the main street and burned it publicly. The Republican state central committee announced today that a new banner will be stretched, which will be protected by force if necessary.

Bryan got a big bunch of letters and telegrams today and spent the morning answering them.

## COOKSON SAT ON BURGLAR'S HEAD

Ignominious Close of Daring Room Thief's Career of Crime.

New York, July 9.—Braving death on a narrow coping 14 stories above the street, the thief who for 10 days had plundered rooms of the Hotel Belmont, met his fate today. He entered the rooms of Mrs. Josephine Cookson before daylight and when the police arrived Mrs. Cookson's husband was sitting on the head of the badly battered burglar.

In the last two weeks robberies in the Imperial, Waldorf-Astoria, The Plaza, the Chelsea and the Hotel Del Monte, which aggregated thousands in cash and diamonds, have been reported to headquarters.

Nathan Levine registered last night at the Belmont. He was given a room on the fourteenth floor next to those occupied by Mrs. John Cookson and her husband. Early this morning Levine crept along the ledge and was caught while looting the Cookson rooms.

Levine gave his occupation as a biscuit salesman and admitted he had registered at various hotels in order to rob guests.

## SLEUTHS SCENT TIMBER TRUST

Uncle Sam's Minions Investigate Northwest Lumber Manufacturers.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Seattle, Wash., July 9.—To determine whether or not the northwest lumber manufacturers are in a trust to control the production and price of lumber, not only locally, but in the markets of the east and in California, is one of the purposes of the visit here of Charles E. Edgerton, a special agent of the bureau of corporations at Washington, D. C., who has brought with him to this state 10 expert assistants. Four of these assistants are digging up data in Seattle.

Mr. Edgerton proposes to make a thorough investigation of the timber situation. His assistants will go through the records to determine who owns the timber of the northwest and at the same time will try to ascertain how much was paid for it.

## ANXIOUS TO PAY HONOR TO ALICE

Georgian Offers Resolution Complimentary to President's Daughter.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Denver, July 9.—The presence of Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth at the national Democratic convention has greatly pleased the delegates and a general desire to pay appropriate tribute to her is being manifested.

As a result Albert H. Cox of Georgia today submitted to the committee on resolutions the following resolutions, prepared by William Harman Black, one of the original Bryan men of New York, on which he asked them to report later.

Whereas, This convention has been honored during its deliberations by the presence of Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, the daughter of the president of the United States, therefore be it

"Resolved, That we extend to her our hearty greetings, and commend to the women of the United States this example of patriotic interest in our national affairs."

## BODIES FOUND IN RESERVOIR

Boy Is Thought to Have Jumped In After the Girl.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Corona, Cal., July 9.—Searchers today recovered the bodies of Blair Leffler and his sister Edna, who were drowned in the great reservoir at the Ben White ranch here. The boy, who was 12 years old, is believed to have lost his life in a vain attempt to save his 10-year-old sister.

The children were playing near the reservoir last night. When they failed to return at dark their father, who is foreman at the ranch, started a search. The boy's shoes and cap were found near the reservoir, where he had evidently thrown them before jumping into the water after the drowning girl.

Mr. Usher's visit to the city is expected to lead to some new aggressive move on the part of the Canadian line.

## CHAIRMAN HITCHCOCK CONFERS WITH TAFT

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Hot Springs, Va., July 9.—Frank H. Hitchcock, the newly chosen chairman of the Republican national committee, arrived today and entered into conference with Candidate Taft. After the first stage of the conference it was stated that there would be no announcement of the personnel of the executive committee for a week but that it was probable that all on it would be members of the national committee, and that they would be chosen as to be representative of every section of the country. An advisory committee from the country at large will also be chosen.

Hitchcock will leave Hot Springs tomorrow.

An Ohio delegation composed of Robert Reynolds, T. J. Moffatt, J. Stacy Hill, William H. Metcalf and John R. Mallory are here to present to Taft a tentative program for the nomination ceremonies at Cincinnati, July 14.

It was left with Hitchcock to decide whether Senator Hemenway who is mentioned as a probable leader of the western forces, is the man to do the trick in very important territory.
