Market Is Getting Quite Steady and Hide Market Doing Better Again.

Sales to China and Japan Being Made at \$3.60 a Barrel.

Damage News Adds to Price of Cash and Future—Foreigners Firm.

COPPER METAL IS ADVANCED Amalgamated, American Smelter and Anaconda Helped.

The improvement in the leather trade in the east continues. Latest reports from the various centers east of the Rockies indicate that higher prices are still possible. The fact that the manufacturers are again in the market for hides shows a similar condition to rule here. The great shortage in cattle and a revival of business everywhere has caused an upturn in the hide market and a further improvement in the price is again noted today. Manufacturers have suddenly come to realize that there are not enough hides to go around during a normal market and this is what caused their return into the buying arena.

Local buyers are now much eager to purchase and the bidding is quite lively considering the conditions which ruled in the market about a month ago. For the ordinary run of dry hides the trade is now freely offering country butchers 12 1/2c and a pound for a pound. While there is no change for a day in tips the market firm at 1c and 6c and at 4c a pound for green salt bull hides.
