WILL BAR OUT WOMEN

Councilmen Have Made Up Their Minds to Pass the Driscoll Measure Forbidding Saloonkeepers to Allow Women to Enter.

Once more have the members of the city council changed their minds in regard to Councilman Driscoll's ordinance forbidding saloonkeepers to allow women to enter their saloons, and the word was passed around this morning that the measure would be passed at the next meeting of the city council, a week from next Wednesday.

The councilmen declare that at no time were they out of sympathy with the movement to keep women out of saloons but that they did not believe the present measure would accomplish the end intended. Because of this fact the members have delayed taking hasty and final action in the face of high public feeling demanding the passage of the ordinance. They have now come to the conclusion that the public will not be satisfied unless the ordinance is passed and inasmuch as it will not hurt anyone it is declared unconstitutional by the courts they have decided to pass it at the next regular meeting.

CASTRO WITHDRAWS CHARGE D'AFFAIRES

Severing Diplomatic Relations Between Venezuela and United States.

Washington, July 10.—Senator N. Valencia-Gaitan, first secretary of the Venezuelan legation and charge d'affaires, has been directed by President Castro to leave this country immediately. The secretary notified the state department to this effect late yesterday afternoon. This completely severs diplomatic communication between the two countries. The action was expected.

German Commits Suicide.

TEACH USES OF LOGGED-OFF LAND

Forestry Experts Will Attend Convention at Everett, Washington, July 14.

On July 14 there will be held in Everett, Wash., a convention of persons interested in methods for clearing logged-off lands. This is a subject that is receiving wide attention in the northwest, related as it is to the development and settlement of the lands, and President Roosevelt has evidenced his interest by detailing two experts from the forestry department to read papers at the meeting.

Mr. Adams of Everett is in the city spreading the news of the meeting and inviting Oregon people to attend the convention. The meeting is the result of efforts set on foot by Elmer E. Johnston, secretary of the chamber of commerce of Everett, who has for a long time taken much interest in the subject of land clearing.

CLOSE HOTEL ON THEFTS' ACCOUNT

District Attorney Threatens Merchants' Management With Closed Doors.

The second robbery committed at the Merchants hotel on North Third street within a week has turned the police spotlight toward that hostelry. District Attorney Cameron said this morning that a thorough investigation will be made at once, and if it is found that the hotel employees are guilty of the robberies this house will be closed.

The latest outrage to be committed at the place was especially glaring as in both instances the victims were old men. Patrick Joyce, an aged gardener, was awakened at 2 o'clock this morning by a thief working his trousers from under his pillow. The old man immediately gave chase.

The thief slammed the door and ran past the bedroom window. He was bareheaded. Joyce followed quickly and on the stairway found the night clerk and a bellboy with his trousers, but \$75 in cash, which had been in the pocket, was gone.

Mr. Joyce is 69 years old and came from Seattle last night. All the money he has left in the world is 4 copper cents, which he left in a pocket. James Haight, a man nearly 80 years old, was robbed at the same hotel in an exactly similar manner only a few days ago, when \$50 was stolen from him, so he told the police.

The night clerk and bellboy of the Merchants will be brought up before the district attorney this afternoon, and if it is found that the evidence is sufficiently strong against them they will be held for robbery and the city council will be petitioned to shut down the hotel.

PRIVATE FEUD BACK OF NELSON CHARGE

Police Committee Has Inquiring Why Pittelkau Contained Officer.

An echo of the Walton-Nelson shooting case which was tried out in the circuit court last week was heard at the meeting of the police committee of the city executive board last night when the case of Nelson was heard. Nelson was accused by E. P. Pittelkau, owner of the Portland restaurant, of having used a vile epithet. After hearing the case the committee took the case under advisement.

While Nelson denied the charge made against him those present could see why he and Pittelkau should have ill-feeling and expressions were frequently heard to the effect that Nelson and Pittelkau were at odds because Henry St. Rayner, who defended Walton, is a great friend of Pittelkau and frequents Pittelkau's restaurant. The committee, however, ruled out all reference to the Walton end of the case.

Nelson, now crossing policeman at Fifth and Washington, was shot by Walton when the latter attempted to hold up a streetcar on the heights several years ago.

Another case heard by the committee was that against Patrolman Ben Peterson, who was charged by a man named Campbell, formerly a night watchman for the Pacific Engineering company, of having Campbell discharged for the purpose of securing the position for Peterson's father. The case was taken under advisement.
