CHAUTAUQUA'S FIRST BIG DAY OPENS BRIGHT

In stating up the receipts for the first four days of the 15th assembly of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua association last night, the returns showed an attendance greater by several hundred than at any previous year, and yet today will be the first really great day of the season, as it will be the first appearance of a speaker of national prominence, or one whose personality, as well as words, will attract a crowd.

All morning long, beginning with the opening of the gates, crowds have poured in every direction. They have come not alone by trolley, but scores have driven in, until the outskirts of the grounds look like the old-fashioned campsite, with every vehicle, from the one-horse shay to the family surry, was pressed into service, and the patient bled through the long hours of song and exhortation.

Of course the lion that will attract the greatest crowd is John Sharp Williams, senator-elect from Mississippi. His reputation for oratory justifies the desire on the part of so many to hear him, while the stand he has taken upon many subjects, his uncompromising assistance upon points of principle and his fiery leadership of the minority, which has won a splendid victory from defeat and made the forlorn hope blossom into life, makes him a personality that one wants to see and remember having seen.

Flowers Another Attraction. But Chautauqua today offers another and almost a counter attraction, in that it is the flower prize day, and from early morning, stately and in groups, have come the children in their best bib and tucker, loaded down with gorgeous flowers; flowers gay and bright, dainty and dainty, and all of the children's own raising.

Today will culminate the hope of many months of patient toil, when the flowers of the kindergarten are to be planted and then nourished and tended will be viewed and admired by thousands.

Miss Matthews is assisted by Mrs. E. M. Blumauer, Mrs. Rebecca N. Hilton. It is under the auspices of the Mothers' congress, of which Mrs. Blumauer is president.

Special Concert. What, at noon, promises to be one of the most brilliant days in the history of Chautauqua will certainly have a brilliant close if the program is carried out according to schedule. For four years he was a pupil of Franz Liszt and a fellow student of Romberg. For 11 years he was the director of the conservatory of music in the City of Mexico, which receives government patronage. The climate compelling him to leave there, he became director of the San Carlos opera company, which has been heard and favorably received in Portland, but for the past eight years he has been associated with Professor Herbig.

Dr. Roy Genzer, the violinist, was a student for four years of Sevcik, the great violin teacher of Prague, where he completed his studies and remains among the leading violinists of the coast. Mr. Capper has lately come from San Francisco, where he enjoyed an enviable reputation as a cellist. The playing of these three men is most artistic and finished.

The young lady soloists are all graduates of the Willamette college of Music, which is under the direction of Professor Herbig. Professor Herbig is a most conscientious and indefatigable worker, and his work is of a simply marvelous. That he can take 100 or more people, most of them untrained and coming from every section of the country, with localities to overcome and instructions to give from the ground up, and in a few weeks have them not only well trained but singing in perfect harmony, shows at once his personal magnetism and his force as a musical director.
