PORTLAND LOOMS BIG IN ELKDOM

Membership Sixth in Numerical Rank—Los Angeles Looks Winner.

(United Press Leased Wire) Dallas, Texas, July 14.—When the first business session of the grand lodge of Elks convened today it was declared probable that Los Angeles would be selected as the next meeting place, although heretofore Seattle has been looked upon as certain of being named.

Rush L. Holland of Colorado Springs is regarded as certain of election as grand exalted ruler to succeed John K. Tener, the retiring executive.

Estimates place the number of visitors here at 30,000, but fully 50,000 are expected to arrive before the big parade is held Thursday.

With Portland, Or., with an Oakland, Calif., twelfth among the 15 leading lodges of the United States the Pacific coast is making a wonderful showing at the annual convention. The two coast lodges named are among the few in the order having a membership of over 1,000.

The remarkable showing made by Pacific coast Elks was brought to the attention of the members of the grand lodge by the report of Grand Secretary Fred C. Robertson, who said that nearly 400 new members have been initiated into the order during the past year, at new lodges established and only 11 have died. The total number of lodges in the United States at present is 1,112. There are 272 lodges with a membership

of over 1,000. In the numerical standing Brooklyn takes the lead, and the others are as follows: New York, Philadelphia, New Orleans, Chicago, Portland, Or., Denver, Kansas City, Baltimore, Hoboken, Detroit, Oakland, Cincinnati, Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh. Pennsylvania leads the states, with a membership of 25,660. New York, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Illinois are next.

That the Elks lodge, which had its inception in a small theatrical organization known as the Jolly Gunks in 1842, is so widely distributed was shown by the report of the auditing committee today. Total cash on hand is \$220,184.00, distributed in the various funds where it will do the most good and assure the continued prosperity of the lodge.

SHERIFF IS VERY HANDY WITH A GUN

Death Ensues From a Mixup Over the Guardianship of a Little Girl.

(United Press Leased Wire) Redding, Cal., July 14.—Rene Rimbaud is dead today as a result of his attempt to defy an order of the court and because he did not know that Sheriff James L. Montgomery would shoot.

When Michael Karantan shot and killed his wife at Kewauk, June 2, his stepdaughter was taken into the custody of the court. An order was issued making Rimbaud her guardian. He failed to post \$500 bond, however, and the court ordered the sheriff to care for the girl and place her in the hands of Mrs. J. J. Frank.

The sheriff attempted to execute this order last night but met opposition from Rimbaud and his wife. In the fracas that followed the sheriff shot and killed his assailant.

INDICTED BANKERS SET FOR OCTOBER

(Salem Bureau of The Journal) Salem, Or., July 14.—The July term of the Marion county circuit court, Judge George H. Burnett, presiding, opened yesterday. The trial of T. T. Burkhardt, associated with J. Thorburn Ross in the Title Guarantee & Trust company, was postponed until the October term. It is not likely that Burkhardt will be tried at that time, as the attorneys wish to await the decision of the supreme court in the Ross case.

MAYOR AND COUNCIL MUST PAY FOR HOLIDAY

(United Press Leased Wire) Vancouver, B. C., July 14.—Orange-men here yesterday declared a half holiday in the city by permission of the mayor. After discussion last night and on legal advice it is held that the council has no right to grant a half holiday for a private or party purpose, and that if the city employees are paid for the half holiday yesterday it is proposed to make the mayor and aldermen personally liable for the amount of their wages.

JAP LABORERS PLAY MERCHANT

Ancient Game Worked Successfully by Means of Lying Passports.

(United Press Leased Wire) Washington, July 14.—Acting on reports showing that many Japanese who come to this country are merchants or students or members of some other branch of the exempt classes, later take their places as laborers, the government is planning to increase the activity of agents keeping the immigrants under surveillance.

The officials believe that Japan is using every effort to live up to its agreement not to issue passports to laborers but there is little doubt that the regulations are continually evaded. It is believed that a careful watch on the immigrants after they have reached this country soon will lead to a solution of the problem.

The work of the immigration commission on the Pacific coast under the direction of Professor F. C. Mitchell, whose headquarters are in San Francisco, is progressing successfully, according to his reports and he is to be allowed more agents for field work. He is following the immigrants and determining their social progress. He finds that Italians, Mexicans and Russians have showed marked advancement.
