

NO REBEL LEFT ALIVE IN TABRIZ

With Machine Guns Shah's Cossacks Complete Their Job of Butchery.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Vienna, July 11.—The culmination of the horrors of Tabriz has come in the form of a bombardment and massacre, which wiped out the remaining revolutionists and left the city finally in the complete control of the Cossacks under pay from the shah, according to a news agency message received here today. Hundreds were killed.

The bombardment was directed at the Umriath quarter of Tabriz and the firing continued until that place was completely destroyed. The report says the Cossacks used atrocious machine guns in the streets and literally swept them with bullets. Bodies of the victims mark the courses of the deadly firing.

A horrible feature of the slaughter was that the offers of the practically helpless revolutionists to surrender were entirely disregarded and the butchery was continued until every revolutionist who could be found was killed.

This marks the end of the terrible bread riots which followed the first massacre by the Cossacks. Dispatches say that the revolutionists, after becoming crazed with hunger and loss of relatives and friends, refused food from the Cossacks and declared they would fight until they died.

The shah recently dispatched a new detachment of troops from Teheran with orders to put down the uprising and it is supposed the bombardment was started when they arrived and announced the instructions from the ruler.

The dispatches today indicate that the Cossacks at length have practically exterminated the revolutionists and it is believed their cruelties cannot be extended further. The Umriath quarter was the second in which the revolutionists finally made their headquarters after being driven from other quarters.

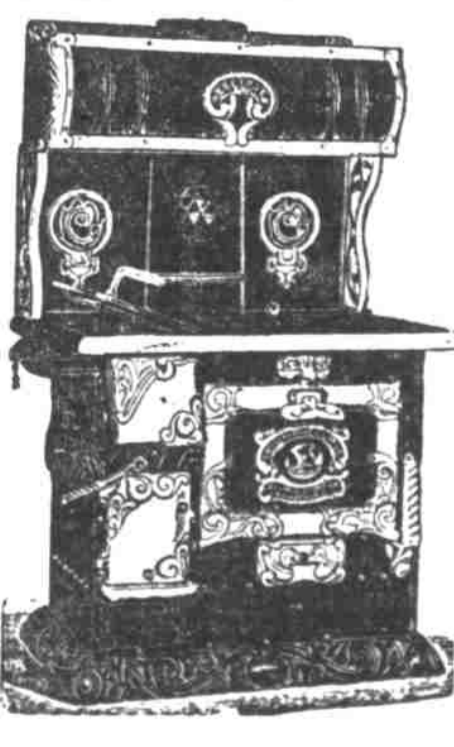
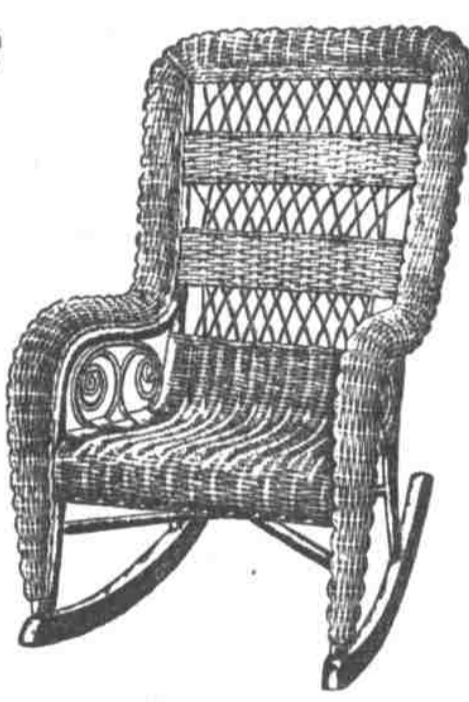

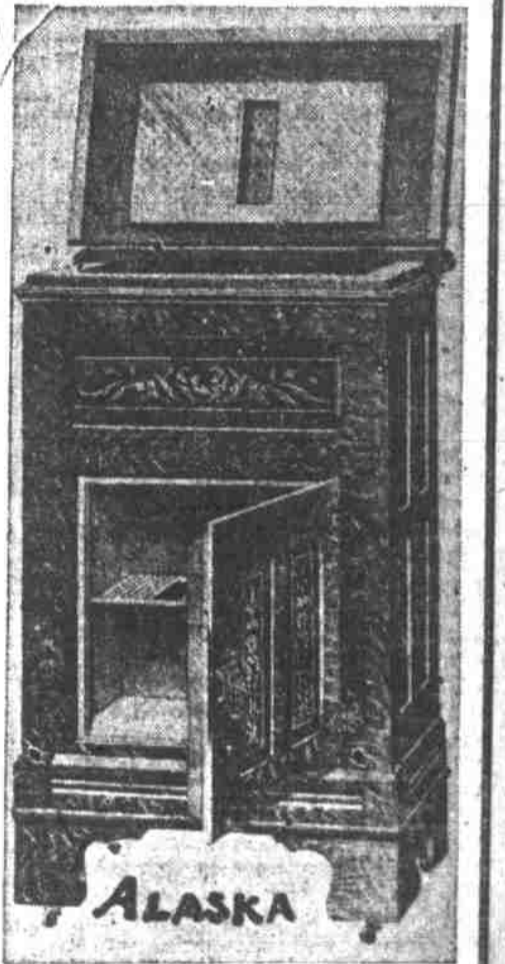
