This team will be composed of some of the star players of the United States. This will be one of the greatest trips that a baseball club has ever taken.

At the present time, baseball is very popular in the Orient. In Japan there are four-team leagues, composed of the university clubs of that country.

The club will sail under the management of M. A. Fisher, one of the best known baseball managers on the Pacific coast.

The personnel of the club will consist of such stars as Frank Chance of the Chicago Nationals, Orval Overall of the same club, Jiggs Donohue of the Chicago Americans, Hal Chase of the New York Americans, Ty Cobb of Detroit.
