Columbus, Ohio, July 16.—The Prohibition convention was called to order at 10 o'clock and Rev. J. D. Pinder of Blaineville, Pa., delivered the invocation. Permanent chairman, Professor Charles Scanlon of Pittsburg, one of the numerous candidates for the presidential nomination, delivered the keynote speech and touched on policies of the party, dwelling upon its accomplishments in recent years.

At a meeting of the new national committee here today the first show of factionalism developed when J. Stewart of Illinois appeared as the leader of a new faction, trying to wrest control of the committee from Chairman Charles R. Jones.

Stewart and Dr. J. B. Cranfill of Dallas, Texas, appeared as candidates for membership on the executive committee. In the hope of defeating the Jones candidates, they developed considerable strength and were elected.

The opposition turned the defeat into partial victory, however, by getting the size of the executive committee increased to nine. Then, on the personal appeal of Samuel Dickie of Michigan, F. C. Hendrickson of Maryland, and A. A. Stevens of Pennsylvania, both Jones adherents, were placed on the committee.

When the convention opened this morning the presidential situation was uncertain.

Platform Outlined.
The platform presented by the resolutions committee provides for the submission to congress of an amendment to the constitution of the United States

until this afternoon, when the names of candidates will be presented for balloting.

CONVENTION PROCEEDINGS OF WEDNESDAY

Columbus, Ohio, July 16.—Nothing of importance was accomplished at the first day of the Prohibition national convention yesterday. The convention worked under a temporary organization and, after receiving the reports of the committees on rules and credentials, and naming the members of the various committees, adjourned until today.

Surmises were rife as to the probable choice for the presidential nomination. Maryland, Illinois and Ohio all had favorite sons on whom they wished to see the mantle descend. Robert H. Patton, temporary chairman of the convention, electrified the delegates with a philippic directed against the position of the Democratic and Republican parties toward the liquor question. The speech has started a steadily growing boom for Patton. In part, the speech was as follows:

Hits the Republicans.
"I believe the personal liberty plank of the Republican platform was inserted intentionally to satisfy the liquor people, who have been satisfied ever since its adoption. In order to make sure of that matter, I wrote to the author of that plank, Mr. Ellis, of this city, attorney-general of Ohio, and the gentleman who met in conference with President Roosevelt and Mr. Taft, and was directed to prepare the draft of the platform. On June 23, I received the following reply to my letter from Mr. Ellis:

"I have your letter of June 22, and find nothing in the sixteenth plank of the platform of 1872 which is inconsistent with good Republican doctrine. Yours very truly, WADE ELLIS."

"In my opinion, Mr. Ellis has told the truth, and there is nothing inconsistent in this plank with good Republican doctrine, but if that is true, the time has come for the anti-liquor vote in the Republican party to cease ratifying that kind of Republican doctrine. Especially is this true when we remember the relation of Mr. Taft to the prohibition issue, his friendliness and cooperation with the great brewer boss politician of Cincinnati, familiarly known everywhere as 'Boss' Cox.

One for Bryan.
"A few weeks since the standard-bearer of the Democratic party, William J. Bryan, declared that prohibition would not be expected to in either the Republican or Democratic platforms. But, while there is no shadow of reference or indorsement of prohibition in

either of these platforms, the Democracy have done exactly as did the Republicans, and, by reaffirming, have placed themselves where they have stood ever since 1872, on the side of the enemies of your home or mine.

"From the fact that Mr. Bryan recently in a public interview confessed to voting and making speeches to defeat constitutional prohibition in his own state, from the fact that in his campaign speeches in Oklahoma he spoke for all of their constitution but the prohibition part, from the fact that he has recently in an interview tried to make this appear as a mere local issue and not a national one, what hope have we that he and the Democratic party will give any aid to the cause?"

"Place alongside the attitude of the Republican party since 1872 the well established views of Abraham Lincoln on this question. I hold in my hands absolute proof that Lincoln was in favor of the prohibition of the liquor traffic. On January 29, 1852, Mr. Lincoln, in company with 38 other citizens of Springfield, listened to a radical prohibition sermon and afterward in writing requested its publication.

"The speech of Mr. Lincoln made by the speech of Chairman Patton resulted in an almost immediate movement to make him the presidential nominee. The Indiana delegation inaugurated the boom.

CHURCH TAKES OVER MODEL MUNICIPALITY

JUDGES IGNORE PETITION TO DISBAR

San Francisco, July 16.—The supreme court today again ignored the petition to disbar Superior Judge Frank H. Dunne, and it is thought nothing will be done about the matter.

The judges of the supreme bench were in chambers this morning, and completed the business of the day without taking any action. None of them has given any intimation as to what will be done with the petition, which grew out of Judge Dunne's rulings in the graft cases and his subsequent criticism of the higher courts for their reversal of the verdict of guilty in the Schmitz case.

TAFT RELIES ON POLITICAL GAME

Senatorial Fight Between Burton and Herrick Saves Candidate From Enmity.

Chicago, July 16.—Close friends of Taft here today say that the entrance of Representative Theodore Burton and Former Governor Myron T. Herrick into the senatorial contest will be the salvation of Taft in Ohio.

Taft then will announce that he can not choose between them, it is said, and in that way will be able to retire absolutely from the senatorial fight and avoid opposing Foraker.

In such an event, it is pointed out, the Foraker followers could support Taft for the presidency, and harmony would be restored for practical purposes, so far as the Taft candidacy is concerned.

Senator Dick, one of the most loyal supporters of Foraker, has been offered a prominent post in the direction of the Taft campaign, and unless the senatorial fight forbids it is expected he will accept.

Taft, it has been learned, has been laying grounds for the establishment of peaceful relations with the various branches of the party in his state for some time.
