SHERMAN AND ROSE WIN FIRST

Big American Weight Men Make Foreign Athletes Take Back Seat.

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, July 16.—Carrying off gold, silver and bronze medals for first, second and third places in the discus throw and breaking the Olympic record, American athletes today made rapid advancement toward first place in the general results of the Olympic games. Although England holds four gold medals and America but three, the Americans have the winners in events in which the athletes from the United States had not counted upon taking first place.

English athletes are showing good form and have the advantage of being on home soil, but results of contests thus far indicate that the Americans will make a hard fight to repeat their performance of former Olympic games and carry off first place in a large majority of the events. Members of the American team have avoided whenever possible entering the events scheduled for the first few days of the meet. They have been sparing for all the time possible in which to become accustomed to the climatic conditions here.

Great Britain's wonderful showing yesterday, when the American team in the 660-yard cycling race and the three-mile race has heartened the home athletes and they are determined to win first to wrest the laurels from the Americans.

Americans Go Wild.
When Martin Sheridan of New York hurled the discus 136 feet, 2 inches today, winning the finals, the American section in the field went wild with joy. At Athens two years ago Sheridan threw the discus 136 feet one third inch. As predicted before the games commenced, American athletes' clean M. F. Herr of New York taking third. Finland had counted upon making a showing in this event, but England expected to take a back seat.

In the preliminaries for the discus finals W. O. Burroughs of Chicago won the first and second sections combined with a mark of 122 feet 3/4 inches. The third section was won by A. K. Dearborn of New York, who captured the 4 1/2 inches J. C. Garrels of Chicago, who made a throw of 133 feet 4 1/2 inches, won the fourth section with a mark of 127 feet 7 1/2 inches. In the fifth section with a score of 123 feet 5 inches. Meredith of England established a new Olympic record for the 100-kilometers bicycle race when he won the second heat in 2 hours, 43 minutes, 15 1/2 seconds.

Rose Wins Final.
Another gold medal was added to the American trophies today when Ralph Rose of Santa Rosa, Cal., won the final shot. Rose won the final shotout by making 46 feet 7 1/2 inches, beating the former record of 45 feet 1 1/2 inches. In the preliminaries for the 16 pound shot event W. W. Cox of the Boston Athletic club won section I with a mark of 42 feet 7 1/2 inches. In section II, C. Garrels of the United States won the preliminary, with 43 feet 3 inches. Rose won the preliminaries in sections 7 and 8 by putting the shot 46 feet 3 1/2 inches. England then regained her lead in the number of gold medals she has captured this year when Taylor won the 400 meter swim. Taylor captured the final in this event in 5 minutes, 36 1/2 seconds.

Thanks to the mighty swats of Ota Johnson, Buddy Ryan and Tom Rafferty and the masterful pitching of Jesse Garrett, Judge Williams, Dave Mackie and a few of us who spend our afternoons at Vaughn street had the time of our lives. The Judge said it was more exciting than that memorable moment when he helped nominate Bill Taft. The score was 7 to 1.

My, how those Beavers grabbed up the menu presented by "Hash" Hosp. They ordered and were served with triples, doubles and singles and out of the soiree came seven runs. All that the southerners could do was to put one over, an earned run in the eighth on a two-bagger by Hosp and a single by Ledbetter.

Both Ledbetters started out like quarter horses, retiring the first nine men up on either side, and allowing but one hit each. The crowd was wild with one of Garrett's shoots for a double, but died on third.

Johnson's scoreless was made in the seventh before the visitors had retired a soul on the Portland squad. Casey cleverly worked "Hash" for a pass and Ryan got in the way of a pitched ball. Then Hosp fooled Rafferty's sacrifice and the sacks were bulging with Beavers. Danzig's second single pushed Rafferty into triple and Johnson registered on Rafferty's error. The Angel catcher dropping an almost perfect throw from Delmas.

Fast double spoiled the chances for ringing up again when Hassey drove the ball into Delmas' hands and Del whipped it to Spink, completing the rally. There were three other fast doubles pulled off during the matinee. Smith and Violesle officiating in the other one for the Seals and Casey, Johnson and Danzig pulling off Portland's brace.

The lone pine for the southerners was Johnson, who pitched up the record for the Portland team of pitching the most shutout innings of the season. Not a run was scored off him. He followed for 20 innings before Hosp put an end to the record.

CHINESE CLEARING HOUSE FOR GIRLS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, July 16.—Sam and Gee Fong, Chinese, are in prison today accused of conducting a clearing house, in which white girls have been sold into slavery to oriental masters.

It is alleged that 27 American women are now held prisoners by the local Chinese, and steps are being taken to effect their release.

Some of the white slave traffic, which has been carried on secretly here for months, reached the police through the efforts of a beautiful 17-year-old girl. Miss Held ran into the police station last night and sobbed out her story to Lieutenant Joel Smith. She told of being abducted and sold as a slave to a Chinese master. Last night she made her escape, and reported the sale of 27 white girls to orientals. It is believed the raid that is being planned will result in clearing the mystery white girls have been sold into slavery to oriental masters.
