U. S. ENGINEER VISITS UMATILLA PROJECT

Opportunities for Production Best in America, Says Arthur Davis.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Hermiston, Ore., July 16.—Arthur P. Davis, chief engineer of the United States reclamation service, who has just visited the Umatilla project, speaks in the highest terms of it. He says: "The extreme fertility of the soil, with consequent wonderful production and the excellent location from a standpoint of shipping facilities and pleasant climate, make this project, in my estimation, the best irrigation scheme in America."

Location for Goquam Bridge.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Aberdeen, Wash., July 16.—The location of the new steel bridge across the Hoquiam river will be decided when an answer has been received from the officials of the Union Pacific railroad, which will assume part of the cost of the structure.
