BOOTH TRAIL TO BE TAKEN TO EVIDENCE WILL CONSUME THREE WEEKS.

Expected That Taking of Evidence Will Consume Three Weeks.

Oregon's land fraud mill, somewhat out of practice with long clause but still able to revolve, began another series of revolutions this afternoon the purpose of which is to convict ex-senator R. A. Booth, his brother, ex-receiver of the Roseburg land office James Henry Booth, and T. E. Singleton of the crime of conspiracy to defraud the government out of 160 acres of its timber land Lane county.

The defendants are represented by Judge L. R. Webster, Dan J. Maloney and A. C. Woodcock of Albany. The work of drawing the jury was commenced this afternoon at 2 o'clock. It is expected that the trial will be long and tedious because of the great mass of evidence to be introduced by the government and which may require two or possibly three weeks.

The subscription list started by The Journal last Friday for the nurses' cottage at the open air sanatorium is nearing the \$1,000 mark which was set as the necessary amount to be raised.

Tuberculosis, that disease which preys upon the weakened system and finds an easy victim in the woman dragged down by incessant care and worry, is one of the dread enemies of the tired nurse. And it is that these afflicted ministers to the sick may themselves receive some of the rest and care and quiet that they have given others, that this cottage is to be built.

JUDGE DENIES MOTHER'S PETITION

Presiding Judge O'Day in the circuit court has refused to disturb the guardianship of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society over Ethel McMahon, 17 years of age, whose mother, Mrs. Luella McMahon Dickinson, last week secured a writ of habeas corpus in order to ascertain where the girl had been placed. Ethel will remain in the care of the family where she has been for several years, this being satisfactory to the girl and to her mother.

Mrs. Dickinson wanted the guardianship of the girl taken away from Superintendent Gardner of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society and given to the family with whom she is living. Judge O'Day said that question should be taken up in the county court.

FIND ELEPHANT FOR G. O. P. RACE

A traveling circus company, through its agent who is now in the northwest, has offered the amusement committee of the Country Club & Livestock Association an elephant to represent the G. O. P. end of the novel race suggested by Chairman J. L. Meier.

This agent is covering the coast in the interests of his show as well as drumming up business for a confetti concern among country fairs and other exhibitions. His proposition as made yesterday is to furnish the nimble pachyderm for the contest in return for the confetti concession during the race meet and livestock show.

The committee, however, does not feel that confetti-throwing will be any meritorious attraction and has no considered the offer favorably, although it will make the showman a cash proposition if he will send his elephant this way.

This particular beast is a "baby" elephant—that is, he is quite a bit under 100 years old, and having been born in this country, has been trained to pull "tricks," and one of them is a race in harness with a dog holding the reins. His trainer also mounts him for an exhibition of hurdling where the brute has a chance to show racing form. The circus is now in Nebraska, but is headed eastward and the elephant could be brought to Portland without much difficulty.

As for the Democratic end of the race, the committee has received tenders of a dozen racing "hacks," the most tempting of these offers having been made by a cowpuncher from Albany, who is willing to put up a side bet of \$500 that his mount can beat any elephant that ever "blew a blast."
