BEALS TAKES A FALL OUT OF HATFIELD

Government Forecaster Produces Figures to Disprove "Rainmaker's" Claims.

Portland, Or., July 16, 1908.—Editor Journal:—The interview with "Rainmaker" Hatfield published in yesterday's Journal has just come to my notice. He is quoted as saying the normal rainfall in Sherman county from May 1 to July 15 was 2.22 inches and that the rainfall during a period of 23 years is one inch. I desire to call attention to the fact that no record of rainfall for 23 years has ever been kept in Sherman county. The longest record known is one from Grass valley, covering a period of about six years and was fragmentary in 1904. A record for the year 1898 was kept at Moro and a record was started at Wasco last September. The rainfall for the period in question from these records is as follows:
