

LINER ROSE CITY HAS BIG CROWD

Leaves Ainsworth Dock With Every First-Class Berth Taken.

STEAM SCHOONERS ALSO GO CROWDED

Many Are Left Behind When Big Liner Pulls Out, the Tardy Ones Declining to Accept Steerage Accommodations.

With 362 passengers on board and all the freight she could carry, the Harriman liner Rose City, Captain Kidston, departed this morning from Ainsworth dock for San Francisco. She would have had more passengers had the late comers been content with steerage accommodations. The first class berths had been reserved long before the hour of departure.

Traffic between Portland and San Francisco is steadily increasing and it is heavier this summer than ever before. Not only do the regular liners get capacity crowds but the independent and irregular steam schooners seldom come in or depart with room to spare.

This is the finest time of the year for ocean traveling and tourists are not losing sight of this fact. But there is also a good steady stream of traffic outside of the tourist crop. Portland people take a run to the Bay City for a little outing and San Franciscans come north for the same purpose.

The steam schooner Rosamita sailed last night for San Francisco via San Francisco, carrying 875,000 feet of lumber and a full list of passengers.

DIAMOND O IS SPEEDY.

GOOD GOLF, SAYS

BOURNE, BECAUSE TAFT CHOSE IT

(United Press Leased Wire.) Hot Springs, Va., July 18.—With a wagonload of trunks and golf clubs, Senator Jonathan Bourne Jr. of Oregon arrived here today loudly proclaiming his prowess at golf. He denied that he came here to consult Taft on political matters and insisted that the excellent links were the only attraction the resort holds for him. "I knew the golf was good here, because Taft chose it," he said. "I demand the best golfing, and refuse to play on any but the best links. "Absolutely no political significance attaches to my visit. I simply came here to play golf. I hope, however, that I may have an opportunity to meet Taft in a match game before I leave." Taft said today that he hoped to complete his speech of acceptance of the Republican nomination before night. He has not accepted Bourne's challenge to a battle on the links.

WALTON GOES TO PEN FOR HEALTH

Charles W. Walton, convicted after three successive trials last month, and sentenced to serve three years in the penitentiary for shooting Patrolman Claus Nelson in September, 1904, has decided to go to Salem without further delay. Yesterday afternoon Presiding Judge O'Day granted a request revoking the writ of probable cause that had been secured. This will not stop proceedings on appeal, which will be rushed through to the supreme court. Walton's attorney stated that his client's health is poor under confinement in the county jail, and he desires to return to Salem, where he has been for more than three years while the appeal from his first conviction was being carried to a conclusion. Originally he was sentenced to five years for shooting Nelson and to 20 years for holding up a Willamette Heights street-car.

Whether or not Walton will be tried again on the latter charge is a question for District Attorney Cameron to decide. In view of the fact that the witnesses are scattered, that conviction might be even more difficult than it was in the Nelson case, and that Walton will have served nearly seven years in all when his present sentence is completed, it is unlikely that he will ever be brought to trial on the other charge.

WEATHER REPORT

The high pressure area over the northwestern portion of the United States has increased in magnitude and now extends from the north Pacific coast to the Dakotas. The barometer continues relatively low over California, Arizona and New Mexico, and local maxima are scattered in the latter two districts. The disturbance yesterday over upper Michigan is now central over the lower lakes; it has caused heavy rains in all the northern states east of the Mississippi river. The presence of the high pressure area over the north Pacific states is causing fair weather with high temperatures on the Pacific slope except near the immediate coast, and in the latter it is moving very slowly eastward, fair and warm weather will continue in this district over Sunday, except along the coast, where it will remain relatively cool with foggy mornings and clear afternoons.
